

Tex Rickard's Luck in Fight Weather Will Hold for Today

WASHINGTON, July 25. (UP)—Tex Rickard's luck for "fair weather fights" will hold Thursday night when Tom Heeney and Gene Tunney meet in New York at Yankee stadium.

The United States weather bureau said tonight the weather would be fair and slightly cooler, adding there were no indications this forecast would be changed during the next 24 hours.

Rickard has had fair weather during practically every heavy-weight championship fight he has staged, with the exception of the first Dempsey-Tunney meeting at Philadelphia.

Both fighters are magnificently trained for the battle. Tunney expects to weigh 185 or 190 and Heeney 185 or 189.

A final analysis of the chances of the two fighters reveals that Tunney is the logical favorite to defend the title if he fights the calm, cautious battle of Chicago, barring one almost fatal lapse in the seventh round.

But there is every reason to believe that Tunney will throw caution to the winds and attempt to knock out Heeney. If Tunney elects to fight Heeney, man for man, the champion has only an even chance, certainly no better, of leaving the ring with his laurels.

Tunney undoubtedly has developed a terrific right hand, but Heeney has taken the best shots of Sharkey, Delaney, Risko and Paulino and never wavered, and for the champion to risk his title gambling for a knockout may prove disastrous.

Rugged, rock-ribbed, and stout of heart, Heeney soaks up punishment, and he most of all wants Gene Tunney to stand up and fight.

"No man can knock me out with six ounce gloves," Heeney said. "I expect Tunney to hit me plenty early in the fight, but I am strong enough to take it and I believe I can give as much or more in return."

Neither fighter has ever been knocked out and there is nothing on which to base the opinion that either of them will have the fatal

Hollywood Gains On Senators in Pacific League

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25. (UP)—Hollywood, second place team of the Pacific coast league, cut down the lead of the first place Sacramento Senators to one game today.

Hollywood scored six runs in two innings and added three more in as many periods to defeat Seattle 9 to 3. In the first game, the second game was called at the end of the seventh inning with the Stars winning 4 to 3. The Stars scored once in the seventh to break a tie.

Tilden Reinstated on Davis Cup Team

NEW YORK, July 25. (UP)—The reinstatement of William T. Tilden to the United States Davis cup team was brought about through the intervention of Myron T. Herrick, ambassador to France, the United States Lawn Tennis association revealed tonight.

A statement issued by the association said Herrick had requested consideration of Tilden's case after he had learned that the barring of the American captain "had caused a most unfavorable impression in France."

At the same time the association said it had not changed its position in any way on the Tilden case and still thought it "was in the best interests of sportsmanship to forbid Tilden to play."
