

Big Bill Comes Back Strong In Paris Tennis Tournament

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, PARIS, July 27, (UP)—Like a man out of the grave, "Big Bill" Tilden came back today to defeat Rene LaCoste in a gruelling five-set match in the Davis cup challenge round between France, holder of the trophy, and the United States, the challenger. The scores were 1-6, 6-4, 2-6, 6-2.

Ruled off the United States team last week, but subsequently reinstated to his role of captain, Tilden today strode to tennis heights unknown to him in his younger days, when he beat the French ace and gave America an even break in the two open singles matches.

In the other match, Henri Cochet, fiery Frenchman, swept John Hennessey, Indianapolis youth, to defeat, 5-7, 3-7, 6-3, 6-2.

All even at the end of the first day's play, George Loft of Chicago and Hennessey will play Jacques Brugnon and Jean Borotra of France in the doubles Saturday. In the final singles matches Sunday Tilden will play Cochet and Hennessey will meet LaCoste. Possession of the trophy is determined on the basis of the five matches.

Playing inspired tennis, Tilden snatched LaCoste's string of victories over him in what was probably the finest exhibition of endurance and courage in the veteran American's long career.

LaCoste attempted the same tactics which had been successful against Tilden for almost two years, but they failed. The Frenchman attempted to wear Tilden down in the first four sets, and snatch victory from "Big Bill" in a dramatic last-minute rally just as he defeated Tilden at Wimbledon.

LaCoste was all set for the final drive, but to the amazement of the sad-faced Frenchman, Tilden from someplace in

his ageing athletic limbs summoned the strength to take the fifth and final set.

Wild with enthusiasm, the gallery rose as one to pay Tilden the greatest tribute any player ever received in Paris, when LaCoste drove the last ball out of bounds and victory once more perched on the racquet of the old master.

Broken-hearted over his defeat, LaCoste sobbed over a glass of lemonade in the dressing room after the match.

"I tried everything I knew to win," LaCoste said, "but Tilden refused to weaken. He was as great a player today as he ever was. His change of pace was remarkable. I never found another who could mix fast shots with slow ones, but I believe his service aces were the best."

POSITIONS IN LEAGUE CHANGE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27, (UP)—Teams of the second division of the Pacific Coast league furnished three surprises today and Sacramento again took undisputed leadership of the circuit.

Oakland moved from the lower division into a tie with the San Francisco Seals for third place when the Seals lost to the last place Seattle Indians while the Oaks were beating Hollywood to break a tie between the Stars and the Senators. The seventh place Portland Beavers furnished the other surprise by beating Los Angeles.

Sacramento beat the Missions, although it was out of the early part of the game and three errors by the Missions accounted for the victory.

Oakland beat the Stars, 3 to 2, by scoring once in the eighth inning to break a tie score. The Oaks were also out of the early part of the game but bunched their safe ones a little better than Hollywood.

Seattle and San Francisco were tied at the end of the sixth inning, when the Seals made three runs, but the Indians scored once in the seventh and again in the eighth to win, 7 to 5.

Ten innings were required by the Beavers to defeat Los Angeles, 7 to 6. The last inning was almost a game in itself when the Beavers scored three runs and the Angels came back with a barrage of hits but were stopped when they had crossed the home plate twice.
