Taking Olympic Oath Held Most Impressive Ceremony

AMSTERDAM, July 28.—The most impressive of all athletic ceremonies—take the Olympic oath—occurred here today in the presence of 45,000 officials, spectators and athletes gathered in Holland's red brick stadium for the formal opening of the ninth Olympiad, a modern event whose origin dates back to 776 B. C.
Silence held the vast throng, which a moment before was wildly applauding the march of the athletes, as Harry Dents, Dutch football player, repeated the oath in behalf of more than 4000 competitors.
The huge stadium presented a picturesque scene as Dents strode forward and repeated the historic pledge:
"We swear that we are taking part in the Olympic games as loyal competitors, observing the rules governing the games, and anxious to show a spirit of civility, for the honor of our countries, and for the glory of the sport."
Dents' words rang impressively clear and were amplified and audible in every corner of the stadium. Beyond him in the semi-circle stood the leading athletes from 13 nations, holding national emblems, while farther back stretching across the bright green infield rank after rank of men and women stood, all sub-

scribing to the Olympic oath.
A discordant note to the ceremonious opening was struck when the French delegation, numbering 250, refused to participate in the opening parade, because of alleged favoritism on the part of the stadium officials towards the Germans.
The trouble started Friday when French athletes, attempting to gain admittance to the stadium for practice, were barred while the Germans, arriving on the scene during the argument, were readily admitted by the gatekeepers.
The incident, which so easily might have been avoided, was generally regretted, especially since it might have led to the French withdrawing from the Olympic games altogether.
After a long conference attended by the French ambassador, the secretary of the Dutch Olympic committee and Count Clary, president of the French Olympic committee, the French decided to participate in the Olympic games.
It was announced the Dutch agreed to publish a communique giving full satisfaction to French claims and also remove the offending gatekeeper. Inasmuch as France did not take the Olympic oath at today's ceremony, the French high jumper, Lewden took the oath immediately after the meeting.

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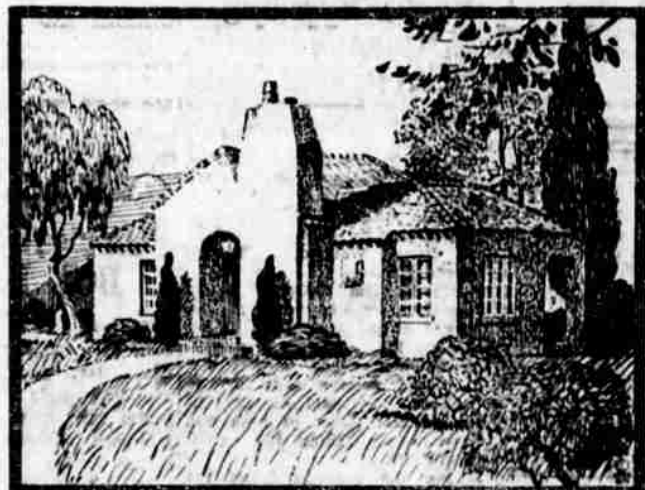
