Query: I am tired of an all white bathroom. What can be done without too much expense?

Answer: Paint the woodwork a soft green, salmon or apricot color and hang curtains of contrasting color at the window. Use a fast color wash material for curtains. The walls may be painted, too, with a washable paint.

Query: Are long davenport tables used now?

Answer: The davenport table has had its day and now the occasional or end tables are more popular. But never throw away a good piece of furniture just because it is a bit out of date. If the lines of wood and finish are good, there is always a very good reason for keeping it.

Query: Should each child in the family have a room of his own, and how should it be furnished?

Books of Today

WHEN WEST WAS WEST
By Owen Wister

With one's reading habits altered to meet the incisive brevity, the subjectivity and the dramatic intensity of the contemporary story, it is not easy to read stories written so wholly in the manner of nineteenth-century authors as these of Owen Wister. They are long and leisurely, burdened with detail, and such drama as they disclose—and some of them are fantastically melodramatic—is given a quality of drugged, liquid distance such as one sees in a cinema fight shown in slow action.

West was West in the days which Wister describes. Where girls in khaki breeches and sweaters now high-bike Indians walked in beaded buckskins, where the cars now line up for gasoline, ponies were huddled in dusty rows before an ominous saloon; where tourists wash their handkerchiefs in geyser water and throw their cigarette butts into purple mud, intrepid men explored and studied; and Cuater over the country which now clicks in tedious miles past the windows of the Pullman cars.

And Wister was Wister when he wrote "The Virginian." How many middle-aged Americans who read it in their gay days keep green the memory of that story by recommending it to their boys and girls and by re-reading it themselves, off and on! Perhaps they may still hope, in spite of years, to find the Wister that they knew in these stories of the West that he knew once so well. If so, they will be disappointed. But perhaps it is not Wister who has changed. Perhaps it is themselves, or the times.

Saturday Review of Literature.

FOLLY'S HANDBOOK
By Mary Agnes Hamilton

We have so many new novels of England which are no worse than we can do ourselves with hard, Wolfe's or Whosever, that it is surprising to find a volume with as much merit as "Folly's Handbook" coming quite unannounced and uncommenced. There is an austerity about Miss Hamilton's book that makes it poor material for the burb writer, which perhaps accounts for the silence regarding it. It makes little compromise with the casual reader, being reminiscent of the Henry James technique in not letting anything be settled until the end. The chapters as they appear pile detail upon detail and elucidate stroke by stroke the characters in the granger of the plot, but never hand out gratuitously any master-key that will unlock either the complete situation or a complete personality.

It might be called a mystery story of the character in the dragger of the plot, but from clue to clue after the identity of the criminal, one pursues almost equally labyrinthine ways to the summation of individualities. The flaw in this portrait of the woman as an artist lies in Miss Hamilton's failure to stamp it definitely enough with her intention. There is room for suspicion that some of the reader's puzzlement concerning the motives that lie behind the actions is shared by the author herself. But if "Folly's Handbook" fails a little short of its aim, what it does achieve is far more worth while than anything attained by many finished novels that accomplish their ends because their ends are so easily accomplished.

victs. He fired at the fleeing men, but himself was killed. The convicts were joined by another who had been attached to a plow squad. Five of them returned later of their own accord.

An automobile was commandeered by four of the men. The car was met by a posse of officers and ordered to halt. The convicts opened fire with their guns and the officers returned the fire. Davis was seriously injured in the fight and another deputy, E. L. Bell, received a flesh wound.

Four convicts were captured and another gave himself up. The remaining three struck out for the lowlands along the Brazos river.

FOREST FIRES STILL BURNING

PENDLETON, Ore., July 28. (AP)—Forty-six fires were burning today in the Umatilla forest. The forest service is controlling the situation.

Twenty fires were reported in the Heppner district. Five or six covered 20 acres or more. One new blaze was discovered today.

J. F. Irwin, supervisor of the forest, is in charge. Four small fires were burning in the Ukiah district. The north end of the forest, in Washington was fairly free of fires.
