Arguments Given For Construction Of Long Tunnel

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31. (A. P.)—Arguments in favor of building a tunnel through the Cascade mountains in Washington figured in the interstate commerce commission's grain rate hearing today, in the appearance of John L. Hartman, of Seattle.

Hartman, a member of the Washington Cascade Tunnel commission, was called by Attorney W. C. McCulloch, of the Port of Portland, to testify concerning statements in the commission's report, which McCulloch said supported Portland's contention that a differential in grain rates to Portland over Puget Sound could be continued.

Hartman waited to testify while the cross-examination of J. P. Newell, rate expert for the Oregon public service commission, was being finished.

McCulloch said that the tunnel commission's report showed that the Cascade mountains in Washington formed a barrier which made it difficult for railroads in that state to compete with railroads operating along the water grade of the Columbia river. Each rise and fall of 1,000 feet in elevation is equivalent to more than 15 miles of level hauling, the report stated, and in addition the railroads are under expense in fighting snow.

Cruiser Searches for Yacht Overdue In Spanish Race

SANTANDER, Spain, July 31.

(AP)—The United States cruiser Detroit today was searching off the coast of Spain for the yacht Azara, overdue in the race for the King Alfonso cup. The Azara, sponsored by the Detroit Yacht club, sailed from New York on July 7.

The king himself has grown uneasy. He ordered all government boats available at Asturian ports be instructed to make

a search for her. The king asked continually for the latest reports from the radio station at Cabo Mayor.

Radio calls were broadcast continually but no answer came from Azara. Ships along the route that the yacht should have followed reported they had seen no trace of her.

Unfavorable weather today was preventing small craft from setting out in search of the missing vessel. The Spanish destroyer Proserpina returned to port after an unsuccessful search.
