

Yanks Come Out of Slump in American League Wednesday

The Yankees are out of their slump. Evidence of that fact is contained in figures surrounding the 12-1 beating the merciless New Yorkers administered to the St. Louis Browns yesterday.

Babe Ruth contributed homer No. 42. Bob Meusel added another. And the Yankees together solved the best three St. Louis pitchers could offer for a total of 16 hits. Even Henry Johnson, Yankee pitcher, chipped in with five singles for a perfect day at bat.

The champions played errorless ball in scoring their second victory in as many days.

Continuing their recent ruthless methods of dealing with opposing pitchers, the Chicago White Sox took both ends of a double header from Boston, 4 to 2, and 7 to 3. The second game marked the fifth straight victory for the White Sox and enabled them to move into fifth place.

Detroit opened the series with Washington by gathering 10 runs off four pitchers, while Earl Whitehill held the Senators to five.

Six runs in the second inning were enough to give the Philadelphia Athletics a 6-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians.

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Retirement of Tunney Starts Gossip Concerning Successor

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Accepting calmly Gene Tunney's retirement from the prize ring, the boxing world today speculated over the retiring heavyweight champion's successor.

Will Jack Dempsey elect to fight again and win back his crown?

Will Luis Firpo return to the United States to try for the honor he almost won once?

Will the next champion spring up "over night" like Dempsey?

Those were some of the questions which puzzled boxing fans. Twenty-three years ago James J. Jeffries retired as undefeated heavyweight champion, and it was not until five years later when Jeffries came back to fight Jack Johnson at Reno, Nev. July 4, 1920, was the undisputed champion's remark that he believed in retiring was the scarcity of good heavyweights and Tex Rickard may have a stupendous job on his hands arousing the public interest in the heavyweight elimination tournament to determine Tunney's successor opening in September.

If the coming heavyweight tournament is no better than the last one which left Tom Heeney as the survivor, the public is not likely to get excited nor recognize the winner as legitimate champion.

The whole thing may terminate in either Dempsey or Tunney coming out of retirement to save the situation. An indication that Tunney may not be definitely and finally through with the ring is gained from the retiring champion's remark that he believes a heavyweight does his best fighting from 28 to 32. Only 30 now Tunney may stay out of the ring for a year, grow tired of the business or social world and come back in 1929.
