Scaled proposals will be received by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls for the purchase of street improvement bonds aggregating \$274,021.01, authorized by Ordinances 1023, 1026 and 1027 of the City of Klamath Falls, for the improvement of units situated in Klamath Falls, Oregon, as follows:

Improvement Units Nos. 65, 69 and 71, all as more fully appears on the plans and specifications on file with the Police Judge in the matter of the improvement of the aforesaid units. Proposals to purchase said bonds will be received by the undersigned up to and including the 13th day of August, 1928, at the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. of said day, and opened at a regular meeting of the Common Council immediately thereafter. 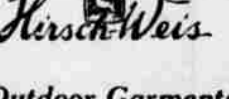
