'Hail, Hail,' Chosen As G. O. P. Chorus

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Hoover has several favorites. Parodies of "Ramona," the California song, "Who," which rhymes effectively with Hoover, and the Stanford University anthem are all well liked by the republican nominees.

But the republican music experts have argued that none of these create sufficient noise to offset the Smith air. Nothing could do that but "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here," whose chords offer more encouragement for voice volume than any other.

Furthermore, it was said, the "Hail, Hail" piece is much more widely known than "The Sidewalks" air. Its selection, therefore, was claimed a magnificent musical coup for the republicans. Hoover did not seem perturbed by the momentous musical decision of his campaign leaders. He went automobile riding today and conferred with John Knight, president pro-tem of the New York state senate, and Harry Culver, president of the National Association of Real Estate Exchanges.

Knight claimed New York for Hoover. "Governor Smith has pulled the limit of his strength in his gubernatorial races," said Knight. "The state is normally republican. The democratic organizations of Buffalo and Rochester are split. I think Smith will lose a lot of votes in the presidential race which he would get if he was running for governor."

Culver advised the nominee against over-confidence of his workers. "That is the thing we have to fight now in California," said Culver. "If people are confident they will win, they won't get out and vote."

Another Killing Scored in Battle

The underworld tonight was reluctant to say the four men under arrest had committed the thirteenth murder of the year attributed to racketeers, but none denied that the death of Binetti and the shooting of his wife could be traced to the Los Angeles rum war.

Five other men accused of a previous gangland killing were held for trial today at a preliminary hearing. They were alleged to have murdered Angie Palombo "hip pocket" bootlegger.

They were Dominick De Soto, Rocco Gravino, Mike Pupillo, Vito Ardito, and Leonardo Galsano, said to be former Chicago gangsters. Bail was denied.

Southern Pacific Trains Allow Stop In Klamath Falls

Through passengers can now spend a day in Klamath Falls without losing time between San Francisco and Portland, a recent check of time tables reveals.

The Cascade arrives in Klamath Falls from the north at 7:35 a. m. It is possible for passengers to stop over, catch the 10:30 northbound, and arrive in Portland in time for business. By going direct through, actual time is saved, of course, but the train arrives too late to do business.

The same thing holds true of passengers arriving from Portland on the 9:45. Going directly to San Francisco, they arrive too late to accomplish anything; by stopping here, they have a day in Klamath Falls, and arrive in San Francisco early the next morning.

Gossip Leads to Knife Killing, Report Declares

NEW YORK, Aug. 7. (UP)—The highly respectable suburban neighborhood known as Sunnyside Gardens learned today that "innocent" neighborhood gossip may lead to tragedy.

For as Mrs. Frances Kirkwood, a comely matron of 32 years, sat in the district attorney's office and confessed that she had murdered her husband by slashing him with a bread knife, she blamed the whispering of the neighborhood gossips for the situation which led to the killing.

And this afternoon the "whispering neighbors" were startled by the shouts of newboys who hurried frantically up and down the streets of Sunnyside Gardens crying "Murder—Extra."

Mrs. Kirkwood, who was previously married and divorced and mother of a 12-year-old boy, made her confession calmly. She consumed half a dozen cigarettes and stopped occasionally to freshen the fading rouge on her lips as she told her story, first to police officials and then to District Attorney Richard Newcomb.

When her confession was completed, it was said she probably would be charged with first degree murder.

Wednesday morning, the district attorney's office announced. An attack on identification of the girl's body may be the hope of defense counsel. It was intimated today in seeking to obtain release of Beitzel.

Neighbors of the couple at the coroner's inquest declared the body to be that of Barbara Mangler, but the identification was described as superficial.

Hearing Set. Beitzel was arraigned immediately after the charges were filed and his preliminary hearing was set for August 10.

The girl was slain, in the opinion of detectives, because Beitzel was unwilling to marry her as she approached motherhood.

A coroner's jury returned an open verdict in the case, failing to fix definitely the cause of death.
