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China Pheasants To Arrive Today

Six hundred young Chinese pheasants, in good condition to start out life "on their own", will be released at various points in Klamath Friday by District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes.

Word was received Thursday from Gene Simpson, superintendent of the state game farm at Eugene, that the birds would arrive in crates Friday morning for release.

The game birds have been carefully raised at the state farm and under normal conditions should thrive in the Klamath country which, heretofore, has proved to be an ideal location for pheasants.

Approximately 600 were released in Klamath last year. Just where the birds will be turned loose has not yet been announced.

Insurance Motive Held Possible in Amabile Killing

MERCED, CALIF., Aug. 9. (UP)—With four persons under arrest in connection with the murder of Ralph Amabile, a sheep raiser near Los Banos two weeks ago, three of whom have been formally charged with the slaying, a \$20,000 policy on the life of Amabile entered into the case tonight as another possible motive for the killing.

Auton Negras and his wife, cousins of the slain man, were the last two to be placed behind bars, both being arrested following the capture in El Centro late yesterday of Robert Deluchi, a former employee of Amabile.

According to the theory of sheriff's officers now working on the case, Deluchi acted as Negras' agent in the slaying so that Negras would profit from the insurance. The pair were partners in the sheep business and were said to be involved in financial difficulties.

Amabile's body was found on a deserted ranch in the hills near Los Banos with a bullet hole in the back. His truck, in which he had been riding, was picked up on the streets of Tracy where it had been abandoned.

Deluchi disappeared on the day of the murder in company with Edna Johnson of Los Banos and after a state-wide search they were taken into custody at El Centro.

Amabile and Deluchi are said to have engaged in a fight a few days prior to the slaying of the former.

Crop Outlook for Here Held Good By Agriculturists

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (UP)—A marked improvement in crop prospects in the United States during July, indicating yields per acre of 4 per cent more than the average of recent years, was announced today by the agriculture department.

"Prospects have improved most radically in the great plains region extending from Texas and central Colorado to Montana because of abundant rainfall over practically all this region," the department said.

An August 1, the department said, the corn crop was 83.3 per cent of normal, indicating a yield of 3,029,561,000 bushels as compared with 2,773,708,000 bushels harvested last year.

The average yield of winter wheat per acre was estimated at 16 bushels. Preliminary production indicated to be 578,599,000 bushels, as against 553,248,000 bushels in 1927. The quality of winter wheat was said to be 88.7 per cent, compared with a 19-year average of 89.8 per cent.

In four states the condition on durum wheat was 83.8 per cent of normal, indicating a production of 84,343,000 bushels as compared with 76,155,000 bushels last year.

On August 1 other spring wheat was said to be 81.5 per cent of normal. This indicated a production of 228,350,000 bushels, the department said, as against a harvest last year of 218,152,000 bushels.

The indicated production of all wheat, on the basis of condition estimates, was placed at 891,292,000 bushels, as compared with 873,000,000 bushels in 1927.

Conditions of other crops was estimated as follows:

Oats, 84.8 per cent normal, indicating a production of 1,442,000,000 bushels; barley, 86.5, indicating production of 344,000,000 bushels; whole potatoes, 85.8, indicating production of 460,000,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 79.9, indicating production of 81,200,000 bushels; tobacco, 71.6, indicating production of 1,256,000,000 pounds; peanuts, 79.5, indicating production of 847,000,000 pounds; tame hay, 81.7, indicating production of 88,800,000 tons.

Prelate Denounces John J. Raskob in Georgia Address

MACON, Ga., Aug. 9. (UP)—John J. Raskob, democratic national chairman, was characterized by Bishop James F. Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, here today as a "knight of Columbus, a chamberlain of the pope of Rome, and a slanderer of the Methodist ministers of the south."

Bishop Cannon's remarks were made during an address at a campaign conference of anti-Smith "dry" democrats of Georgia.

Raskob, according to the bishop had also failed to substantiate a recent statement that influential laymen of the Methodist church in the south had warned their pastors to discontinue attacks on Governor Alfred E. Smith.

Other speakers at the conference, predicted Herbert Hoover would carry Georgia.
