

U. S. BANKERS REFUSE LOAN TO NICARAGUA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11. (UP)—For the first time in about 20 years American bankers have declined to participate in a loan to Central America. It was definitely learned at the state department today that negotiations for a \$12,000,000 loan to Nicaragua, which the state department had tentatively approved, have collapsed.

Officials here and in Managua have been informed by New York banking houses which were asked to consider the loan that they do not care to take part in the proposed plan to lend Nicaragua this sum, despite reports by the recently resigned American collector of customs for Nicaragua that the republic's finances are in better condition than in many years.

New York bankers did not disclose their reasons for declining to handle the proposed loan. In many quarters, however, the view has been expressed that their action was based on congressional and other criticism of alleged "Wall street interference" in the internal affairs of Central America.

The state department had worked out the details for the contemplated loan and three banking houses were interested in the transaction. There had been several rumors recently that they would decline to carry through the proposal. Of the bankers in the United States active in foreign financing, the three who were considering handling the Nicaraguan loan were virtually the only ones who, during the last 25 years, have risked extension of credit to the republic.

Well-Known Flyer Killed in Crash

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 11. (UP)—Officials at Oakland airport issued an appeal through newspapers and radio stations tonight in an effort to locate the parents of D. A. De Fiori, World War flyer, killed late today in a crash at Bakersfield.

The flyer's wife collapsed at Bakersfield after learning of De Fiori's death and was unable to give his parents' address.

The flyer, they said, was a veteran in commercial aviation and was known as one of the most conservative aviators on the Pacific coast.

LEO P. KELLY TO PLEAD NOT GUILTY, PLAN

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 11. (NP)—Leo P. Kelly, butcher boy paragon of Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, will enter a plea of not guilty in superior court Monday to a grand jury indictment charging him with the murder of the wealthy society matron.

"My client is innocent of the murder," Defense Attorney S. S. Hahn said tonight. "Why should we plead him guilty?"

Hahn said the statement of Mrs. Mae Switzer, matron's woman in the case, which told of the travesty between Mrs. Mellus and Kelly, showed conclusively Kelly would not have committed the brutal murder and mutilation.

"In a drunken fury because he feared Mrs. Mellus was about to put him out of her life after five years, Kelly committed the murder," Chief Homicide Deputy Clifford Thomas of the district attorney's office said.

"There will be no compromise. We will go the limit to send Kelly to the gallows."

Kelly was found in a closet in the Mellus home shortly after Frank Mellus, returning from a fishing trip, summoned police and told them of the discovery of his wife's mutilated body.

more than enough to reveal his possession of this basic knowledge and his comprehensive appreciation of every vital problem.

Omaha World-Herald (democratic)—It was not a great speech. It is not original, it is not constructive. . . . his agricultural plan required no scientist, no international famous constructive engineer to discover. It was rejected indignantly by organized agriculture everywhere months ago.

Henry J. Allen, publisher Omaha Bee-News (Hearst newspaper)—He is forming his own ideas about improving the condition of agriculture, building them on the sound foundation of his long administrative experience and his inherited sympathy for the farmer.
