

Gene Arrives in Gotham; Outwits News Reporters

NEW YORK, Aug. 13. (UP)—Wearing smoked glasses, a turned up coat collar and a Panama hat pulled down over his eyes, Gene Tunney came back to New York today and successfully avoided newspapermen. The retired world's heavyweight champion, returning here from the summer home in Maine of his fiancée, Mary Josephine Lander, fooled reporters. He was supposed to have taken the Bar Harbor express which arrives at Grand Central station at about 8 a. m., instead he was a passenger on the Oakland express, an earlier train, and alighted at 125th street.

Tunney's movements after leaving the train were lost in mystery. He did not call on his manager, Billy Gibson. He was reported not at his suite in the Biltmore hotel. He was not seen in Greenwich or Stamford, Conn.

Tunney is scheduled to sail Thursday for Europe on the Mauretania. He has reserved a comparatively modest room on the upper deck of the liner.

Another of the many rumors which have been circulated about the retired champion got started shortly after his arrival here today. This latest concerned a secret marriage between Tunney and Miss Lander this week before Gene sails for his walking trip on the continent.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. (UP)—The anti-war treaty, which is scheduled to be signed in Paris by 15 world powers on August 27 will be deposited in Washington, Secretary of State Kellogg announced today. Kellogg said he was uninformed as to whether Spain and Russia would sign a supplementary protocol.

U. S. Olympic Team Leaves for Home With Many Medals

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 13. (UP)—The liner President Roosevelt, carrying the United States Olympic team home from the ninth Olympiad, left at 12:35 p. m. today for New York.

Representatives from many other nations also left for home today, leaving Amsterdam somewhat deserted after many days of athletic pageantry.

The Olympic games were officially brought to a close Sunday when Queen Wilhelmina awarded the Olympic prizes. The United States received 23 first place medals, 17 second place

medals, and 15 third place medals for a total of 54 prizes. Many of the United States athletes were not here for the closing of the games, but were scattered all over Europe, participating in various athletic meets.

After proclaiming the 1928 Olympic games over, Count Halldor-Lafour said: "We now ask the youth of the land to meet again four years hence at Los Angeles for the 10th Olympiad."
