Some Can Carry Bottle in L. A., Says Police Chief

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14. (UP)—It is all right for persons, having an "economic value" to carry a drop or two on the hip for a party, and they will not be bothered by the Los Angeles police, according to a statement made today by Chief of Police James E. Davis to the police commission.

Police, the chief said, had been instructed to devote their efforts to stopping activities of bootleggers. He said that in several cases where police had found home brew in homes which was not manufactured for sale prosecution was dropped.

"It is not the policy of Los Angeles policemen to arrest citizens of economic value for carrying an occasional bottle," the chief added.

Democrats Get Campaign Fund Boost From DuPont

NEW YORK, Aug. 14. (UP)—A contribution of \$50,000 to the democratic campaign fund, the appointment of additional state directors of finance, and a farm belt representative's indictment of Hoover's agriculture policy, kept democratic national headquarters busy today.

Pierre S. Du Pont, who recently threw his support to Governor Smith because of the prohibition situation, gave the \$50,000, and Chairman John J. Raskob of the democratic national committee promptly accepted. Raskob said he would accept contributions of unlimited amounts "without regard to size so long as they are made public and used properly for educating the voter."

Du Pont's gift was the largest yet received. John D. Ryan and John T. Smith, both of New York, had made contributions of \$10,000 each.

Raskob said he was not worried by a statement made in San Francisco by State Senator Thomas Love of Texas, who predicted that 450,000 democrats in that state would bolt the party.

"I think such statements discredit themselves," Raskob said.

The democratic chairman plans to confer Wednesday with Senator Glass of Virginia and Josephus Daniels, who will stop here after meeting Governor Smith at Albany.

One of the farm representatives who discussed the agriculture problem with Governor Smith Monday, today issued a statement through democratic headquarters which discounted Hoover's policy for relief.

William Hirth, publisher of The Missouri Farmer at Columbia, Mo., was the first of the visitors at Albany to stress his position.

"Mr. Hoover's statement on agriculture is just about what I expected," Hirth's statement said. "He has fixed up a very pretty Christmas tree for the farmer, and viewed at a distance, it is beautiful. But when the farmer examines it closer he will find it is a clever delusion—a Christmas tree without presents."

"How does he justify his party's neglect of agriculture? He didn't have the courage to say a solitary word as to his position on the McNary-Hangen bill, which constitutes the very crux of the surplus control problem."

Wheeler Criticizes Hoover
Senator Wheeler of Montana today criticized Hoover for re-

maintaining silence on the "scandal" of the Harding administration.

"People of my section have not forgotten that Hoover was a cabinet member with Fall, Daugherty and Denby," he said. "Mr. Hoover at that time never raised his voice in protest, and my recollection is that Hoover was present at the cabinet meeting at which it approved turning over the naval oil reserves to Doherty and Sinclair."

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14. (UP)—The three leaders of the Pacific Coast league won easily today and the feature of the circuit was 10 innings of scoreless baseball in the game between Oakland and Portland.

Crashhead of Oakland and Yerkes of Portland hurled shutout ball for 10 innings and then Yerkes weakened in the 11th to let the Oaks win, 2 to 0. Oakland made eight hits and the Beavers five.

The league leading Sacramento Senators beat Seattle, 5 to 0. Keating, Sacramento pitcher, allowed only seven hits and kept them scattered.

Hollywood, three games behind Sacramento, scored three runs in each of the first three innings and made four in the seventh to beat the San Francisco Missions, 13 to 3.

Taking the lead in the first inning and never relinquishing it, the San Francisco Seals beat Los Angeles, 10 to 5. Each team made three errors.

Sixty-five Miles Road to Be Done By County in '28

"Fifty miles of surfacing? Yes, of course; but work has been progressing so rapidly and effectively, that we've decided to add an extra 15 miles, bringing the total of completed projects this year to 65 miles."

This was the announcement yesterday of Gene Henry, county road engineer, in charge of county road construction. When the electorate ratified the half million dollar road bond issue providing for the completion of the county trunk line road system, it was announced that 50 miles of the total 100 miles of road involved, would be completed in 1927, and the remaining 50 miles in 1928. With an "open" spring, and with prompt action by contractors, the county court has seen its way clear to raise this 1927 total to 65 miles.

Mr. Henry issued a progress report on county road projects now under way.

The three units of the Wood River valley project will be completed this fall unless inclement weather intervenes. Grading has been started by G. I. Stebbins, contractor, and surfacing will be undertaken within the near future. The three roads, aggregating 18 miles of grading and surfacing, included the Port Klamath-West highway, the Port Klamath-Wood River highway and the Seven Mile-Port Klamath highway.

Near Completion.
Surfacing of the Rock Creek highway (Fremont road) from the Fremont bridge northwest to the west boundary of the Geary ranch, is steadily nearing completion. Angelo Doveri is the contractor.

Lakes on Cascade Crest Draw Vacation Visitors

Construction of the four mile section of the North Pole Valley road is under way by T. F. Ireton, contractor, and will be completed by fall.

Ten miles of the West Side Langell valley highway has been graded and surfaced and an additional eight miles of grading completed. Contractors are the W. D. Miller Construction company and L. F. Ireton.

On the east side of Langell valley, grading of six miles of new road is under way.

Building Sprague road.
Sprague River residents are elated over the progress on the road from Hildebrand ten miles to the reservation boundary. This road—said to have been one of the worst in southern Oregon—connected Klamath Falls with the eastern Klamath lumber community. H. F. Vicory has completed about one-third of the clearing and grubbing, and the section of grading which cannot be handled by the county grading machine.

Surfacing of the last section of Oregon's segment of the Klamath Falls-Weed highway, nine miles from Midland to Color on the state line, is well under way by the W. D. Miller Construction company. The quarry is located at Ady.

Grading Machine Success.
Efficiency of the county grading machine has been ably demonstrated on the three-mile grading job between Keno and Warden, said Mr. Henry.

"Anybody who has any doubt of the grading machine's reliability, need only look at that job," the county engineer commented.

With the fall months approaching, contractors are leaving no stone unturned towards completing their respective jobs by fall.

Lakes on Cascade Crest Draw Vacation Visitors

Along the crest of the towering Cascades, Klamath has a wonderful heritage of scenic beauty. It is an ideal retreat for those who seek the pleasures of woods and lakes and, at the same time, wish to enjoy a certain degree of solitude.

These are the impressions brought back from the Sky Lakes country by Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Henderson and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Grafton, after a four-day camping trip in the Cascades.

Starting from Cherry Creek Haven with horses supplied by Jud Short, the party made its way up the slopes of the Cascades over nine miles of trail. Arriving at Horseshoe lake—a beautiful crescent-shaped body of water, about a mile in length—the beauty of the place so captivated them, that they decided to pitch camp.

"Within a radius of several miles of our camp, there were a dozen or so beautiful mountain lakes, nestled in small craters or at the bottom of dips," said Mr. Henderson. "Some were only several acres in area; others somewhat larger; but all contained trout. And such trout! There are lots of them and eager to take a fly; some are rainbows, others lake trout, but whatever the species, all fight like trojans."

The Klamath Falls campers spent four days fishing and hiking, and then reluctantly packed up and trudged back over the beautiful nine-mile trail to Cherry Creek haven, near the upper end of upper Klamath lake.

The campers then went off on another jaunt. To the north of Diamond lake flows the north fork of the Umpqua river—a stream remote from the paths of

man and beautiful in its state of natural beauty. After a strenuous hike when at times it was necessary to descend precipitate cliffs, they arrived at the bottom of the beautiful Tokatee falls where the Umpqua tumbles over a ledge of rock and drops with a mighty crash and roar into a large pool below.

It was there that the campers completed their camping trip. Fish? Well, there were so many and they were so large, that the men of the party finally became conscience stricken and refused to take in another line. The trout ranged from 8 to 18 inches and fought like wild cats.

"We have fished in many places in the west, but have yet to see the equal of the Klamath country in this respect," commented Mr. Henderson on his return.
