In late returns to draw up to second place, with only a small number of precincts unreported.

Begg Has Early Lead

The race on the republican ticket was close all day between Begg and Cooper, with the former leading by a margin of less than one vote per precinct, with 8,000 of the state's 8,800 precincts reported. Cooper began pulling up in the late returns and with only a few precincts unreported had gained a lead of more than 4,000 votes.

Martin L. Davey of Kent had clinched the democratic gubernatorial nomination in his race with Earl D. Bloom of Bowling Green, and W. H. Davey's lead had grown to 25,000 votes, with a few precincts yet to be reported.

Burton Winner

Another sure winner was Representative Theodore Burton of Cleveland, who had a lead of more than 100,000 for the republican short-term senatorial nomination.

State Director of Agriculture Charles V. Truax was victor over former Congressman George White by 15,000 votes in the democratic race for the long-term senatorial nomination.

United States Senator Simeon D. Fess was unopposed on the republican ticket for the long-term nomination.

Nicholas Longworth, speaker of the house, was renominated in the first congressional district and most of the other incumbents seeking renomination to congress were successful.

Crater Visitors Break Record

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 15, (P) — A total of 70,429 persons in 21,468 automobiles visited Crater Lake National park up to August 12 this season. This was shown in the monthly report of Superintendent G. C. Thompson. This breaks all previous attendance records. Last year to the same date there were 44,581 visitors in 13,583 cars.

Daniels Warns Governor Smith

(Continued From Page One)

Smith to soft-pedal the prohibition issue, told newspapermen that he did not personally consider it the most important issue of the campaign by any means, and denied that the governor's affiliation with the Catholic church was the cause of much opposition in the South.

Smith's Stand Mistake

Daniels recalled the statement he made at Houston just after the convention, in which he said that he thought Smith's telegram, boldly setting forth his stand on prohibition, was a mistake.

"I see no reason to change that opinion," said Daniels. "However, the governor's statement is not a repudiation of the democratic platform on prohibition."

Daniels' own attitude toward prohibition is well known. One of his important acts as secretary of the navy was to give the United States a bone-dry fighting fleet and his newspaper has waged an unremitting war for prohibition enforcement.

His speech of acceptance already completed before his meeting with Daniels, Gov. Smith prepared today to relax a bit before his official notification a week from tonight.

Thursday he is to receive Senator Walter F. George, of Georgia and on Friday, Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana.

L. Rogers, interstate commerce commission examiner, asked a direct question regarding this point and Newell gave him a direct answer.

Although the railroad attorneys did not appear greatly interested, Newell told them that such a railroad with a western connection would save the railroads \$2,319,631 yearly by sending the freight across the cross line, directly toward markets, instead of around the great circle of Ogden and Roseville, as at present.

Despite repeated questioning, Newell stuck to his contention that a road from Crane to Crescent City, connecting eastern and western Oregon, actually would make operations in this territory more profitable for existing roads. Joint rates and short hauls would yield a larger return than the present long haul, he said.
