

Yanks Get Five Game Lead When Athletics Lose One

The Philadelphia Athletics dropped five full games behind the leading Yankees when they split a doubleheader with St. Louis Saturday. The scores were 3 to 2, Philadelphia and 5 to 4, St. Louis.

The A's played tight baseball in the first game, winning the game with one run in the ninth. In the second game the Browns got away to a two-run lead in the sixth and managed to hold. Fox hit a home run in the second game.

Cleveland proved a stepping stone for the Yankees who trotted on them with an 8 to 5 decision. Cleveland scored all their runs in the seventh but the Yankees already had 7 runs to their credit and didn't care much. Gehrig hit a home run.

Marberry held the Detroit Tigers to 4 hits and Washington won a game, 3 to 1. The rival pitchers, Ruel and Hargrave, led their teams in batting, each getting two singles in three trips. Carroll allowed only 8 hits but his mates made 3 errors behind him.

Ed Morris allowed the Chicago White Sox 10 hits but kept them so widely scattered that Boston won a 3 to 1 victory. Boston gained the lead in the first inning and never relinquished it.

Cards' Lead Out When Giants Win In St. Louis Game

The determined New York Giants cut another full game from the lead St. Louis has enjoyed during the past few weeks by whipping the Cardinals in their own ball yard, 8 to 2. It was the second straight for the Giants and reduced the margin of the Cardinals to but one and a half games.

Carl Hubbell, youthful southpaw, took the mound for New York and held the Cardinals to 7 hits. Alexander, dean of National league hurlers, was reached for 11 hits but he managed to keep them from being bunched for a large score.

The Chicago Cubs continued in pursuit of the leaders, beating Brooklyn, 11 to 4. The Cubs' big inning was the second, when they bunched hits for five runs. Hack Wilson contributed a home run. Malone held the Robins to 7 hits while his teammates made twice that number off Petty, Ehrhardt and Clarke.

Pittsburgh split a doubleheader slugging bee with the tall end Philadelphia team, winning the first, 9 to 0, and dropping the second, 11 to 5. Carmen Hill pitched the first game for the Pirates and allowed 7 widely scattered hits. Philadelphia used two pitchers in the second game and Pittsburgh used five.

Trailing 6 to 1 at the start of the ninth inning, Boston's Braves staged a wholehearted rally which netted them 9 runs and completely disposed of Cincinnati. Luque was in the box for the Reds when the Boston artillery broke loose. He was supplanted by Red Lucas, who was unable to retire one of the five men who faced him. Cooney finally halted the deluge but not until the Braves had sailed away in the record book a 10 to 6 victory.

FOREST FIRES COSTLY

Each day several fires are reported by the Forest Protection forces.

Under favorable conditions any one of these may become a conflagration which will destroy thousands of dollars worth of property, the homes of settlers and even human lives.

The Klamath county's forests are not alone her principal commercial mainstay, but also the source of outdoor beauty and enjoyment.

Fishermen and hunters understand that preservation of wild life and inland fisheries begins with protection against fire of forested areas.

All of us wish to pass on to our children a country no less beautiful and productive than we received it.

This can be done by stamping out needless fires. Some fires are not preventable. Machinery for control of such fires is each year being improved, but most of them still result from human carelessness.

Control of forest fires is not the function of any one group. Nor is it alone that of Government, State or private organizations. It is the business of every citizen, man, woman, boy, and girl—for all benefit through existence of our forests.

The way to solve our forest problem is not through use of less lumber, but by protecting existing forests and by growing new ones. New forests will grow if fires are kept from

running over deforested areas. If not destroyed, our mature timber will keep pay rolls alive.

Needless fires—started through human carelessness—comprising 75% of those which each year occur, interfere with local industry, destroy wild life, pollute streams, impair water sheds from which our domestic supplies are drawn, impair water supplies for irrigation purposes, and renders non-productive thousands of acres which might be producing valuable crops.

A little more care on the part of those going into wooded sections will save thousands of dollars worth of taxable property, help maintain our payrolls and preserve the natural beauties of our country.
