Resolution of Intention

Main street from Second street to Eleventh street and Eleventh street from Main street to Oak avenue.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portions of said streets by installing a lighting system thereon, being the specifications and estimates attached to the plans filed herein on the 25th day of June, 1928 be, and the same are hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement shall consist of improving Main street from Second street to Eleventh street and Eleventh street from Main street to Oak avenue by installing thereon an ornamental street lighting system, including all necessary underground conductors and the installation of lamp supporting standards and all appliances, apparatus, equipment and lighting fixtures necessary and or incident to a complete system, ready for operation and the maintenance and operation of such system for a period of ten (10) years, including in said maintenance the furnishing of electrical energy of sufficient power to properly supply the said system.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described be, and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by said improvement, to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the northeasterly line of Second street at the southwesterly corner of Lot 4, Block 19; thence along the northeasterly line of Second street a distance of 126.0 feet; thence on a line parallel with the northeasterly line of Main St. over and across Blocks 18, 17, 16, 15, 14, 13 of the Original Town Addition and Block 48, Nichols Addition over and across Eleventh street to a point in the center of the alley of Block 3, Canal Addition, which point is at right angles to and 211.5 feet from the northeasterly line of Eleventh street; thence southeasterly to a point on the northeasterly line of Main street a distance of 255.8 feet from the northwesterly corner of the intersection of Main and Eleventh streets; thence southeasterly along the northwesterly line of Main street a distance of 123.8 feet; thence over and across Main street and along the line dividing Lots 4

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Monday, the 19th of September, 1928, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. at the Council Chambers in the City Hall of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be fixed as the time and place for hearing objections and remonstrances against said proposed improvement and the contemplated improvement, a notice headed "Notice of Street Work," in letters of not less than one inch in length and said notice shall contain in legible characters, a copy of the resolution of the Common Council, the date of its adoption and the Engineer shall file with the Police Judge an affidavit of Posting said notice stating therein the date when and place where the same have been posted, all as more fully set forth in Section 262, Page 93 of the City Charter.

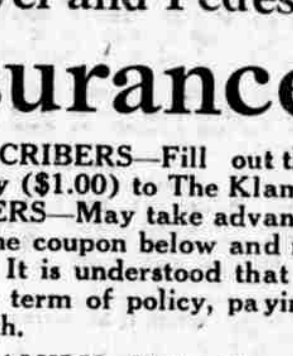
"Please, madam, will you give me the gallon of liquor this man delivered to you?" politely requested the chief, flashing his badge at the same time.
