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for cheaper freight rates and an economic and stable co-operative marketing system.

The candidate did not mention tariff protection as the third announced phase of his program but he assured the farmers he would work if elected president, to re-establish equality between industry and agriculture.

Like Revival Meeting

The ceremony for the speech was conducted like an old-fashioned revival meeting. There were numerous violin solos and mass-singing of "Auld Lang Syne," "The Star Spangled Banner," and "Hoover" parodies on modern airs.

When his speech was concluded the nominee retired to the home of his cousin, Mrs. O. O. Oliver, where he remained the night.

WEST BRANCH, La., Aug. 21 (UP)—Wandering through the reminiscences of his childhood, Herbert Hoover came face to face with the farm problem in its own home.

With wheat prices sliding on the Chicago exchange, with upwards of 15,000 farmers gathering here for his agricultural relief speech, with corn growers fearing their market will follow the wheat tobogganing and with Republican farm leaders like Brookhart and Dickinson of Iowa exhorting the local assemblage in old-fashioned political revivals, the Republican presidential nominee found little time to inspect the old swimming hole or other familiar sites of his birthplace.

Visits Parents Graves

A hasty breakfast in the house where he was born, a brief visit to the Hillside cemetery where his father and mother are buried, a few moments with his second and third cousins hereabouts, and a trip to the farm where he was "taken in" when his parents died before he was 19 years old, these were the only stolen moments of his sentimental journey.

Instead of reminiscences he found realities. He found Senator Brookhart, a supporter of the late Senator Lillollette and Representative Dickinson, a farm bloc leader, bringing favorable reaction to his three-fold farm program. He found farmers who did not stop to wash after they left the fields clamoring into town eager to hear his farm relief remarks. He found them talking about the wheat slump and the possibilities of a further corn slump.

Talks of Prices

Hoover was deeply interested in the developments. He believes the price slumps were caused by the glutting of the market by southwestern wheat growers. He believes modern reaping methods caused the glutting, which would have avoided itself years ago when the harvest came trickling into market. He believes corn usually follows the price of wheat.

But he also believes that the present situation is an ideal example of what the co-operative marketing angle of his farm program would do for the farmers. He believes orderly marketing would have prevented the present slump.

From the time he stepped off his special train at 7:30 a. m., central standard time, until he met the large gathering of farmers for his speech in the double circus tent back of the old high school building, every moment of Hoover's day was crowded.

Teacher Greets

He was greeted at the train by his old school teacher, Mrs. Polly Carran, who rode with him up to the home of Mrs. Jennie Scollers, owner of the remodeled house where he was born. There he had a ham and egg breakfast with Mrs. Hoover and their son while Mrs. Scollers or members of her family were busy outside selling souvenirs from the two concession booths which had been set up against the house.

The Republican national committee publicity man had picked out the old swimming hole but when Hoover arrived there, he found they had picked the wrong

Meets Boyhood Friend

The old boyhood friends were received in a formal line at the high school building. Twelve in the line were schoolmates, some of whom frankly admitted they did not remember him and he did not remember them.

While he was receiving them, George Anderson, his secretary, leaned over his shoulder and said: "Superior, Wisconsin has just called to say your resignation as secretary of commerce has been accepted." Hoover replied "good," without missing a hand. He declined later to make any statement concerning his resignation, which had been in President Coolidge's hands about two months.

Ceremonies Start

About 10,000 persons were crowded into the two tents when the evening ceremony started at 6:40 p. m., central time. First there was a violin solo and then mass-singing of the Iowa corn song. The speakers' rostrum was decorated with corn stalks and Iowa wild flowers.

Many who were unable to get into the main tent sat around on the grassy slopes outside and heard Hoover's voice through the loud speakers. There were no

Al Smith will make his acceptance speech, and a few scribbled messages wishing him success on the stand from which he will deliver his address.

Some of the tourists and townspeople got an advance taste of the party Wednesday night when the governor appeared on the stand today to try out the broadcasting arrangements, which were found satisfactory, and to be ordered about by photographers.

Laughing and mopping his brow, Smith called to the photographers as they ordered gesture after gesture to give his appearance a realistic touch.

"I won't need any golf today for exercise," he said.

But he did play golf, leaving immediately after his radio test for the home of Norman H. Davis, at Stockbridge, Mass.; about 40 miles away, and returning after his game to the executive mansion to visit incoming party leaders and discuss the campaign with them.

Smith is taking the big event calmly. He slipped away today for a rest, a rest for his voice as much as for his mind. To a crowd of newspaper correspondents in his office today, he pointed to the telephone on his desk:

"I want to get away from this friend here to save my voice which has got to go all over the country Wednesday night," he explained.

The governor will wear his double breasted blue serge suit for the big occasion. He so told his old friend William F. Kenny, who was perturbed about how he should dress up for the occasion and called the nominee today on long-distance telephone from New York.

Jack Sharkey Suffers Injury, Unable to Fight

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (UP)—Jack Sharkey, Boston contender for the heavyweight boxing title vacated by Gene Tunney, will be unable to fight again before the last of November.

The Boston heavyweight, winding up his final day of training here for his bout with Big Boy Peterson in Boston Wednesday, turned on his left knee while dodging a blow from his sparring partner, Andy Wallace, and tore the semi-lunar cartilage and an internal lateral ligament.

The injury forced the cancellation of three fights in which Sharkey was to have been a principal. The bout with Peterson was cancelled at once and the physician said he would not be able to go through with his bouts at once, with Pierre Charles in Detroit, Aug. 31, or with Roberto Roberti at Ebbets field next month.

Pays Political Debt

The appointment was looked upon by persons close to Mr. Coolidge as the payment of an old political debt. Whiting was one of the original "Coolidge for President" exponents. Having advanced his interests when the chief executive was president of the Massachusetts state legislature.

Whiting, who is 64 years old and president of the Whiting Paper company, has been a friend of the president for many years. He was active for some time in state politics and held commanding positions in the Republican national conventions of 1920, 1924 and 1928.

The new commerce secretary declined to discuss any plans for his department. He said he preferred to study the situation in the department before forecasting his actions in the cabinet. He said he would follow the policies of the president and the retiring secretary.
