work for which he receives no compensation.

Mr. Underwood has been a member of the school board during the building of this city's splendid school system. Night after night and day after day has he given his time in order that the city might have class A buildings to house the children, and to provide for them the best courses of study with proper instructors. As a directing force in the school work Mr. Underwood has been exceptionally faithful and able. This record is included in the argument of his friends for the mayoralty.

But, Will He Accept?

There is not the slightest doubt that "Major" Underwood would be elected mayor if he would but say the word. This he has not done as yet. He is giving it serious thought but he has reached no decision. In the meantime his friends up and down Main street, among the mill workers and in the residence section are all set ready to go the moment an affirmative answer is given.

The Underwood banner would be unfurled from a hundred different places tomorrow morning if Mr. Underwood would decide to accept the honor.

Friends Have Hope.

So strong is the sentiment for him that his friends will not easily be put off in case he should want to refuse. Many argue that Klamath Falls has passed village days when a cow ordinance or a weed ordinance can take the center of the stage. They say that the city is the largest business undertaking here; that we have entered into heavy construction of municipal projects representing hundreds of thousands of dollars, and that a business man who owns property and pays taxes is needed at the helm. And then they clinch their argument by asserting that Underwood is just that man.

Councilmen to Elect.

Besides the mayor there are a number of councilmen to elect this fall. Little has been said about who will run but it is thought some of the present members will run again. After the mayoralty selection has been made, or at least, after the man for mayor whom many now want, is persuaded to enter the race, if such is possible, then there will be closer attention paid to who shall run for councilmen.

Airplane Stunts To Feature Fair

Another packet of thrills will be offered the crowds at the county fair and Labor Day celebration the first three days of September in the presenting each day at 1 p. m. a series of aerial stunts featuring parachute drops and wing walking, it was announced yesterday.

gram was expected to be completed by the latter part of September.

Boscke dwelt at length on the productive territory through which this line would run, declaring that its construction was expected to prove greatly profitable to the R. P.

Expect Support

Boscke enlarged on this statement by declaring that much support to the new line was expected of through traffic from western

Oregon to the east via the R. P.'s Cascade line from Eugene to Chemaw.

Reverting to the Alturas extension, the engineer said that as soon as the first 12 miles out of Klamath Falls had been completed, contracts for the remainder of the extension would be let.

Besides the \$6,000,000 construction program, Boscke said, the Southern Pacific was expending an additional \$2,400,000 rehabilitating the California and Oregon line from Wendell to Lakeview, meeting the Northern California and Oregon at Alturas.

C. of C. Directors To Send Witnesses

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday, noon made final arrangements for witnesses to appear before the Interstate Commerce commission hearing at Portland to give testimony relative to this Basin. It is the wish of the Chamber directors that the commission be familiar with this Basin, with the growth now going on here, and with the
