

Olympic Athletes Return Happy, Rain, No Parade

NEW YORK, Aug. 22. (UP)—Sun-browned and apparently just one big happy family, the 150 young men and women of the United States Olympic team came home today to a rousing if informal welcome.

A driving rain spoiled plans for a formal ceremony for the victorious, if less than triumphant athletes, and in lieu of a parade up Broadway they were greeted at the liner President Roosevelt's pier by Mayor James J. Walker, Grover Whalen and a large crowd of relatives and friends.

Gin Smashed
Even unsuccessful attempts on the part of two returning athletes to bring in a dozen bottles of whiskey and four fine old jugs of Holland gin failed to cast a damper on the proceedings. Some-what shame-facedly, the two culprits watched customs men smash their imported whoopee-water on a pierhead. The names of the non-prohibition athletes were not revealed and they were not fined because, customs men said, they had stated the contraband in their formal declarations. It was hinted, however, that one of the "bad boys" was a girl.

The athletes had few or no allis for the United States' showing; they grinned much and talked little. Most of them were pulling at cigarettes or pipes, the time-honored notice to the world that they had broken training.

Medals Presented
Frank Wykoff, the young California sprinter, commented in reference to the nearly complete failure of the team in all track events, that "conditions were most unfavorable at Amsterdam." Other runners remarked that the softness of the Dutch tracks handicapped hard track runners. Ray Barbutti, whose 400-meter victory formed the shining exception to the general showing, received an enthusiastic reception at the pier.

Mayor Walker presented a specially struck medal to each member of the team. He, in turn, received a medal from Major General Douglas MacArthur, president of the team, and heard himself called "a good fighting athlete." That was the atmosphere that prevailed. Murray Hulbert, president of the National A. A. U., announced that his Amsterdam quarrel with Fred Ruben of the board of governors of the A. A. U., had been settled amicably and that Ruben's status was unchanged.

Johnny Kuck, the champion shotputter from Wilson, Kansas, left at once for Chicago to fly to Kansas City upon receiving word at Quarantine that his mother was seriously ill. Sad news also awaited Doris O'Mara, New York woman swimmer. Her sister met her and told her of their father's death.

Helen Meany, champion fancy diver, denied that she was engaged to Johnny Weissmuller, champion swimmer. Miss Meany said she was engaged to "somebody else."

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 22 (UP)—Georgia Tech's chances as winner of the mythical Southern conference football title in 1928 appear brightest of any on pre-training season forecasts.

The golden tornado this fall will be virtually the same as the golden tornado last, when it roared through the season with only one defeat—by the powerful Notre Dame eleven—and one tie—with Vanderbilt—and the possibility of excellent that record is good.

Will Rely on Backs
Coach W. A. Alexander will rely chiefly on his backfield again, but his line will be as strong as ever, or stronger.

Peter Pund, captain, and rated by southern sport writers as the most valuable man on the team, will be back at center, with "Cedartown" Ranks again as sub-center. Pund, football followers in the south say, is underrated, and his record overshadowed by the big names whom everybody was watching.

Glenn Holland will be back as sub end, Watkins and Thrash, tackles, and Drennon and Pear, guards, Tom Jones, who played end on last year's freshman team and made quite a name for himself, will be in the regular lineup this year at that position.

Thomas Returns
But it is Maree, another bright light on the 1927 team, who is looked to as the outstanding line-man among the regulars this year. Maree is a tackle, and played a brilliant game last season.

Coach Alex's backfield, however, will be the main sorrow of Tech's opponents with practically every star of last year back. "Stumpy" Thomason, touted as the greatest halfback in the south, will be in the lineup, as things look now. Thomason and Randolph, fullback, have to make up scholastic deficiencies but they are expected to be ready when the first whistle blows.

been statements made that some had signed and that some who had signed said that the proposal had been misrepresented to them.

The plan as proposed is the only way, at the present time, that the lights can be put in. The city budget is not large enough for the city to pay more than they do now for lights. It would be wrong for those who do not benefit to have to help pay for the lights under a general city tax, the mayor stated.

According to the budget arranged by C. C. Kiley, city engineer, the average cost under a 10-year contract, less interest on installation and the amount of the present cost to the city for lights, would be 19306 cents per lineal foot of frontage per month.

It was stated that in some cases the signers were told that the cost would be much greater than the estimate shows.

Before any action is taken the names will be carefully checked.

Wife Gives Life
Miller stepped on the running board of the automobile, one foot in the wet, muddy ground, which completed the circuit to the earth. He fell into a great puddle of water, where he lay screaming and helpless.

His wife rushed from the house and when she attempted to aid her husband, was seized by the paralyzing electricity.

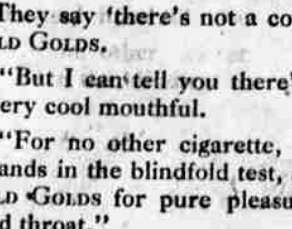
Then in quick succession, Wesley and Eugene, sons of the couple, came to the aid of their parents only to meet the same fate. The screams attracted Carl Meek, a neighbor. He became the fifth victim of the pool charged with death.

Third Nearly Caught
Laurence Miller, a third son, nearly met the fate of his parents and brothers when he too stepped into the pool, but was able to get back out of the water.

The Miller home is some miles from Phoenix in a farm district. Ambulances had difficulty in negotiating the slippery roads.

Meek, who was employed by the Santa Fe railroad, leaves a widow and four small children. They are being cared for by neighbors along with four surviving Miller children.

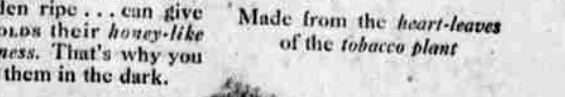
