The performances are set for 2 and 8 p. m. and the big white tops will be located at the Fairgrounds. All day today, the circus 24-hour agent is in town arranging for the coming of the circus by attending to the last-minute details and supervising the distribution of supplies that will be bought here. All the meats and groceries, hay and feed, ice and milk are supplied by local dealers. There will be 1,800 meals served tomorrow in the circus dining tents, with the best the markets afford. Twenty tents comprise the layout of the big show. Main amphitheatre, with seats for 8,000 spectators, menagerie tent, animal tents, horse tents, dressing rooms, side show, wardrobe, barber shop, beauty parlor and blacksmith tents will be set up. The circus stars enjoy the privileges of private dressing room tents.  
The menagerie will have on view many interesting features, including Congo, four-ton hippopotamus; he comes from the valley of the Nile and will appear in the main program. There is little Jimmie, a pygmy hippo, one of the only two in captivity; Jimmie is full grown and weighs but 400 pounds. Cute baby camels, baby bears, elephants and kangaroos will make a hit with the kiddies. Ferocious lions and tigers, pumas and leopards, polar bears and Russian bears, add to the comprehensive display. Three herds of elephants and a full caravan of camels with 300 beautiful show horses will be on exhibit.  
Doors to the zoological department will be open at 1 and 7 p. m. Tickets will be on sale tomorrow at the Underwood Drug Store for both performances at the same prices as charged at the two ticket wagons on the Fairgrounds.

# State Will Seek Reduction in Fire Insurance Rates

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23 (UP)—Lower fire insurance rates on property purchased by war veterans under the state aid act and later taken over by the state because of the non-payment of installments will be sought by Frank Moore, secretary of the State Bonus commission. This was announced by Moore at a meeting of the commission held here today.

Moore said he also would insist that the property shall be protected by insurance during periods when it is vacant. He said recent investigations had indicated that the California Bonus commission has received a lower insurance rate than that offered to the Oregon commission.

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
