

Robs Bank, Loses Money, Caught, Trial in Half Hour

VERONA, Ore., Aug. 24 (UP)—J. E. Doone, restaurant worker, experienced the most eventful half hour of his life here today when he held up a bank, escaped with several thousand dollars, lost the money, held up a motorist and stole his car, was captured, arrested, arraigned and held to answer to the grand jury.

Doone entered the bank and herded Frank Heath, a customer, Alma Kullander, assistant cashier, and Lowell Roberts and Helen Holter, clerks, into the vault. As he turned from the vault, he stumbled and fell, his gun flying from his hand and discharging.

He picked it up, seized a pile of currency which had just been removed from the vault for the opening of the day's business and fled to the streets.

Merchants who had heard the shot emerged from their stores with guns in hand and the chase began. Doone, excited, dropped the money as he was running. Justice of the Peace P. H. picked it up.

Tony Morinello stopped his car at a strategic point in the line of Doone's flight and the robber flourished the gun at him. Tony was so excited he fell out of the car and Doone jumped in.

He was overtaken and captured by the townsfolk less than a mile away, returned to the city hall here where Judge Hill opened court, and held Doone to the grand jury under \$5,000.

When he waived preliminary hearing—all in the space of 30 minutes.

Development Plan for Moore Park Received

How the city should proceed to develop its Moore park on the north city limits is explained in detail by a plan submitted by Professor Peck, landscape engineer of the Oregon State college whom the city park board hired to map out the improvement program on the tract.

The Moore park comprising over 100 acres was donated to the city of Klamath Falls by the Moore estate for the purpose of a city park. At a meeting of the park board services of the college landscape engineer were secured.

Professor's Peck's plans include winding gravelled roads through the tract, attractive paths and vantage points overlooking the lake; locations for tennis courts, volleyball courts and a baseball diamond; and, over in one corner provision for a circular arena within which pageants and other shows of like nature could be conducted.

"Our first unit of development will be the surfacing of roads within the park and, I believe, that work will be undertaken this fall," said City Engineer C. C. Kelley. "Naturally Mr. Peck's plans cannot be realized in one project as we have not sufficient money and, besides, there are other demands on the city park board besides the Moore park."

However the board will proceed with development in a reasonable and logical manner so that, eventually, the park will be one of the best in southern and central Oregon.

Socialists File Names for Party

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24 (UP)—The Socialist party in Oregon today filed with the secretary of state here nominations for state, district and county offices to be filled at the general election next November. The presidential electors nominated by the Socialist party have been instructed to vote for Norman Thomas of New York for president, and James Maurer of Pennsylvania for vice-president.

Albert Streiff of Portland was nominated for the office of representative in Congress from the third congressional district. A complete legislative ticket for Multnomah county was placed in the field.

The party has been asked that the words "socialist principles" be printed after the names of the several nominees on the ballot. This request had been referred to the attorney-general for a legal opinion. The attorney-general previously had held that it would not be legal to place the words "socialist party" after the names of the Socialist nominees.

The nominations were made at an assembly of 100 voters held in Portland recently.
