

Revitalized Yanks Take Double Tilt Regain Old Form

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. (UP)—There's still a spark or two of life left in the old Yankee machine.

Just when it seemed that the pachydermic pursuit proceeding from Philadelphia was about to overtake and trample the champions, Miller Huggins' men stole a march on their pursuers this afternoon by taking both ends of a double-header from the Detroit Tigers and ratching a full game on the ambitious Athletics.

While the white elephants were mired in the rain pools of Shibe park, the Yankees smote their visitors fore and aft. They pulled the Tigers' whiskers, 4 to 3, in the opener and tied a neat 5 to 2 knot in their tail in the finale.

Gain Game
It is not at all unlikely that the narrow margin of three games separated the Yanks from the Athletics before the day's fan began out at Yankee stadium will prove the closest approach of the Mackmen to the American League pennant of 1928.

Huggins has made quite a few changes in the batting order when he employed last spring, when the club walked out into a 12-game lead and a tidy little collection of swelled heads. Since those spring days, the Yankees have strayed upon evil by-paths, apparently believing that the shortest road to any pennant was taking the short end of every other series they played.

Yanks Have Pep
In action this afternoon, however, the world's champions appeared to have snapped out of it. The new batting order functioned at the proper moments and the happy Tigers were kicked right down into seventh place in the American League standing.

Moreover, the Yankees had winning ball pitched for them right off the reel by old Tom Zachary, the withered southpaw obtained from Washington at the bargain price of \$4,000.

Zachary, making his first start in a Yankee uniform, showed that he may be the winning factor in the final drive for the pennant by letting the Tigers down with seven hits.

Meusel Gets Look
An example of fighting spirit which has been lacking in some of the recent exhibitions furnished by the world's champions was provided by Bob Meusel, their erratic left fielder, who has been one of the worst offenders in the matter of loafing around and taking things for granted.

Bob cut loose with a wild heave in the second inning which paved the way for two Tiger runs. When he got back to the bench, Huggins didn't say a word. He just looked at Meusel, and the look would have sliced through six-inch armor plate.

On his next trip to the plate, with two on and two out, Babe Ruth having fanned immediately ahead of him, Meusel slashed a wicked double to center, scoring two runs. In the sixth, he doubled again and scored the tying run. In the eighth, it was his sacrifice fly which brought home the winning runner.

This is the sort of reformation which Huggins had hoped to bring about.

Lazzari to Rest
Tony Lazzari is lost to the Yankees for the rest of the season, except as a pinch hitter. Huggins will not risk permanent injury to his star second baseman by using him in the field.

Peppery little Durocher was at second today and performed ably. The second game was presented to the Yankees by Detroit error, Carroll, who essayed to stifle the world's champions, starting trouble for himself by a wild toss in the first inning. Meusel again drove in a brace of runs, and the whole Yankee machine looked more like a pennant-winning combination than at any time during August.

George Pipiras turned in another of his mastery games, and the gloom which had descended upon Yankee fans of late was materially dissipated.

HELEN WILLS WINS CROWN

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 27. (UP)—Outclassing her young challenger at every department of the game, Helen Wills of Berkeley scored a hollow victory over Helen Jacobs of Santa Barbara in the finals of the women's national singles championship at the West Side Tennis club today.

Miss Wills retained her title, winning 6-2, 6-1. Miss Jacobs never being able to hold her own with the champion after the first few games.

Miss Wills also won the doubles title, partnered with Mrs. Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman of Boston. They defeated Mrs. T. A. Harper of Los Angeles and Miss Edith Cross of San Francisco, 6-2, 6-2.

Emanuel Loses to Walker in Seventh Round of Battle

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27. (UP)—Armand Emanuel, San Francisco's young "boxing barometer," took boxing lessons from Mickey Walker, middle-weight champion, here tonight, but went down for the count of ten during the seventh round.

The local fighter made a mistake by trying to fight toe to toe with a far more clever boxer and took a severe beating before he finally took the knockout count.

The first two rounds were slow and were fairly even. In the third the "toy bulldog", from New Jersey began using his fast left to the head and supplementing them with severe body blows with his right. Walker took the third and fourth by wide margins.

In the next round Emanuel decided he could do some clever boxing himself and became the aggressor. A fast left hook and a right jab had Walker on the run in this round and the champion took considerable punishment.

Emanuel's weight advantage and his longer reach made him look good for two rounds and he had no trouble in winning the fifth and sixth.

Emanuel continued his attack at the beginning of the fatal seventh but despite his fast fighting he could not get past Walker's defense and soon ran into trouble. Walker went a left to the head followed by a hard right hook to the chin that stretched Emanuel full length on the canvas.

The fighting lawyer stayer on the floor for a count of nine, arose and again became the aggressor. Walker fought him off for a moment until he found an opportunity for an exact repetition of his previous performance. That hard left with the quick hook right behind it again proved the Jewish boxer's Waterloo. This time he stayed down for the full count.

Walker's style of hobbing in and out while attacking and weaving from side to side during the lightning bewildered Emanuel from the start and the local fighter never succeeded in fully solving the puzzle.

The title was not at stake. Emanuel weighed 176 pounds and the champion 164 3-4.

Ace Hudkins, "the Nebraska wildcat," challenged the winner before the fight started.

ELIZABETH, N. J., Aug. 27. (UP)—Roberti Roberti, Italian heavyweight, scored a technical knockout over Joe Savage, Philadelphia, after one minute and 50 seconds of the second round here tonight.

The St. Louis Cardinals strengthened their hold on first place in the National League Monday by defeating the Chicago Cubs, 11 to 3.

At the same time, the Pittsburgh Pirates gained in their advance upon the first division by defeating the Cincinnati Reds, 9 to 4, assisted by three errors on the part of the losers. The 1927 champions were out-hit, but played errorless ball behind Fred Russell.

Both contests were free hitting affairs, involving a total of 48 base hits.

The Cardinals are now four full games ahead of the second place Giants.

The New York Yankees increased their lead over the Philadelphia Athletics by a full game, defeating the Detroit Tigers to seventh place.

The St. Louis Browns kept pace with the league leaders, taking two games from the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 6, and 4 to 0.

The Indians, who are battling with the Senators, Tigers and White Sox for fourth place, won from Washington, 5 to 3.

Siskiyou Deer Season to Open Next Saturday

A false rumor which has greatly alarmed hunters has been circulated in the city, according to Rex Lawson, Hunter says that deer killed in California cannot be brought across the state line into Oregon.

The rumor is entirely without grounds, stated R. Lawson, of the Klamath Sporting Goods store yesterday after receiving a letter from the California game commissioner at Sacramento, which states: "There is no law against hunters bringing their deer across the line from California to Oregon after Sept. 1."

Mr. Lawson had heard that deputies would be patrolling the line to apprehend all hunters trying to bring deer across and immediately wrote the game commissioner to find out the true facts.

From the standpoint of days, the opening of the deer season in Siskiyou county comes at a most accommodating time—namely next Saturday, September 1, which will allow Klamath hunters the opportunity to make a week-end of it.

Deer are reported to be plentiful in the northern California district, and many Klamath hunters are planning to take several days off seeking the elusive animals.

Deer season in Klamath opens September 1, in Modoc county, California, September 15.
