Whiting Thinks Hoover Will Win In New England

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27, (UP)—Herbert Hoover will carry Massachusetts in the presidential election this fall, William F. Whiting, Holyoke, Mass., paper manufacturer who succeeded the republican candidate as secretary of commerce, said today.

Whiting said political conditions in New England "looked very good," and said he was confident Hoover would carry other New England states as well as Massachusetts. He said he does not plan to participate actively in the political campaign, devoting his complete time to duties of his new post.

The new commerce secretary said he would endeavor to continue the policies laid down by Hoover and praised the work of his predecessor. He said conditions are improving in the New England textile industry.
