Fleet of Planes Awaits Orders To Start Search

CURTIS FIELD, L. I., Aug. 28. (UP)—A fleet of more than twenty airplanes was waiting here tonight for word which would send them in search of M. M. Morrill, manager of the Curtiss flying services, missing since late Monday in Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's new Curtiss falcon airplane.

Fear for the safety of Morrill and of Edward M. Ronne, superintendent of the Buffalo airport, who is with him, was felt Monday night when they failed to arrive on schedule from Buffalo where the airplane had been overhauled.

The plots of the planes here are waiting for the weather to clear as Capt. Fred Becker, who left here in a travel biplane this afternoon, returned after an hour and a half and reported the visibility too poor for observation.

California Holds Quiet Election

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29. (UP)—Hiram W. Johnson maintained 58 legislative margin tonight in the count of ballots for the count for 3137 precincts nation in the California state primary election.

With returns available at 11 p. m. from slightly more than one third of the precincts in the state, Johnson was maintaining a ratio of slightly more than six to one over Charles W. Randall, of Los Angeles.

In some precincts he polled more than ten votes to one for his opponent from southern California, but in other sections Randall displayed slightly greater strength.

The count for 1137 precincts out of 9082 in the state showed 149,754 votes for Johnson and 23,215 for Randall.

From the start of the count Johnson stepped far out ahead of Randall and the returns from precincts throughout the night only increased his margin.

There was but one contest for the appellate bench in the first district, division two, where presiding Justice Joseph S. Koford, Piedmont, was running behind Frank T. Deasy, San Francisco, who opposed the incumbent in the non partisan judicial election.

Returns from 456 precincts, about a quarter of the district, gave Deasy 15,140 votes, to 15,975 for Koford.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28. (UP)—Reports early tonight indicated an extremely tight vote in the California state primary election for the choice of candidates for the United States senate, the house of representatives, the state legislature and judicial and county offices.

Polls closed at 7 p. m. in most parts of the state but remained open an hour later in San Francisco.

Vote Tight
In some precincts there was a pickup in the balloting a short time before the voting booths were closed, but to a lesser degree than in previous primary contests.

Reports throughout the day from urban and rural communities throughout the state told of light voting, although the effect of hot local contests was felt in some counties.

There was no close race of statewide interest. Senator Hiram W. Johnson, veteran supporter of the Boulder Dam project, was renominated as the republican senatorial candidate practically without opposition.

Balance Cuban Sugar May Be Sold To Other States

HAVANA, Aug. 28. (UP)—President Machado today signed a decree permitting Cuban sugar centrals to sell the remainder of their 1927-1928 crop to any country of the world, instead of to the United States alone, the only restriction being that the sugar for countries other than the United States be sold through the sugar export corporation, a government organization.

The remainder of the 1927-28 crop, approximately 1,000,000 tons, under a previous decree, was destined for United States consumption exclusively. A statement by the National sugar defense commission explains that the action was taken because of lack of demand for Cuban sugar on the New York market, while inquiries were being received from European consumers. The statement adds that Cuban sugar stocks in New York warehouses were being re-sold to European consumers by American importing companies.

Jack Bowring and his 10 piece orchestra will continue to furnish the music for the dances. During the county fair and labor day celebration on September 1, 2 and 3 there will be dances every night, it was stated. The dances will be under the auspices of the celebration management.

A restaurant and grill room will soon be constructed close to the dance hall, when this is done visitors may dance at any time and an orchestra will furnish music on Sunday afternoons, it was stated.

U. S. AIRSHIP INVITED
MADRID, Aug. 28. (UP)—Lieutenant Herrera of the Spanish aviation service announced today that the Spanish government will invite Lieutenant Commander Rosendahl of the United States naval dirigible Los Angeles to come to Sevilla with his airship on the occasion of the inauguration of the Sevilla-Iberia American exposition, when the airship service between Spain and the Argentine will begin.

BLASPHEMY CHARGED
BOSTON, Aug. 28. (AP)—A warrant charging Dr. Horace M. Kallen, New York sociologist, with blasphemy at a recent Sacco-Vanzetti memorial meeting, was withdrawn by Judge Murray in municipal court today. The warrant was issued when police took exception to an utterance of Dr. Kallen that "If Sacco and Vanzetti were anarchists, Jesus Christ was an anarchist."

went to 43 governments through American ambassadors and ministers abroad. If all should accept the treaty it would for the first time in history bind the entire world into one peace pact.

Invitation Explained
In explaining that the original signatories to the treaty had been limited to the United States and those powers signing the treaties at Locarno, the invitations explained this government's hope of extending the anti-war treaty to the remainder of the world.

"My government felt that if those powers (the Locarno signatories) could agree upon a simple renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy there could be no doubt that most, if not all, of the other powers of the world would find the formula equally acceptable and would hasten to lend their unqualified support to so impressive a movement for the perpetuation of peace," the invitation said.

SILVERS DEFEATS BRITTON
NEW YORK, Aug. 28. (UP)—Pal Silvers, Brooklyn welterweight, defeated Jack Britton, former welterweight champion, in a 10-round bout at the Queensboro stadium tonight before 6,000 fans. Silvers weighed 151½ and Britton 149½.

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Law 230 Years Old Will Not Apply to Savant's Speech

BOSTON, Aug. 28. (UP)—Dr. Horace M. Kallen, noted philosopher, probably will not be obliged to stand trial under the Massachusetts blasphemy law enacted some 230 years ago.

A warrant which had been issued for the savant's arrest in connection with a speech he delivered at the Sacco-Vanzetti memorial services here last Thursday was recalled today by Municipal Judge Michael J. Murray.

The action was taken after the judge had studied the ancient statute and a stenographic report of Kallen's speech. It was stated that the serving of the warrant would be delayed pending further investigation, and it was indicated that the chances of the warrant's ever being enforced were slim.

In his speech, Dr. Kallen was alleged to have said: "If Sacco and Vanzetti were anarchists, Jesus Christ was an anarchist. If Sacco and Vanzetti were anarchists, St. Francis de Assisi was an anarchist, Giordano Bruno was an anarchist, Thomas Jefferson was an anarchist, Abraham Lincoln was an anarchist."

It was alleged that the philosopher violated the state law against blasphemy with his reference to Jesus Christ. Judge Murray, after reading the speech, decided, however, that the allegation was not well-founded and that it would be impossible to get a conviction.
