Charlie Chaplin's Mother Dies After Variegated Life

GLENDAL, CALIF., Aug. 28.

(UP)—Mrs. Hannah Chaplin, who gave the world its premier clown, Charlie Chaplin, died today.

Gayety and tragedy, luxury and abject poverty marked her variegated life that led through the music halls of Europe to light opera; from a garret in London to a haven on the shores of the Pacific.

Hers is a story culminated by tragedy.

Always when comfort and happiness were near, sorrow intruded. At last apparent recovery from a mental disorder was checked by death.

Ten years ago, after her sons had won fame and fortune, Zepphus soared over her London home, dodging among the long fingers of search lights, and dropping bombs. A particularly dangerous raid caused her mind to become broken, and

after the war her sons, Charlie and Sydney, also famous as a film actor, brought her to the United States.

Little Harley, as she was known to the stage of London, was a singer of considerable repute. She married Charles Chaplin, a protean actor.

He died 39 years ago, leaving her with the two boys to support.

Years of Struggle

There followed years of struggle, when the three lived the best they might—when often the charity of neighbors provided food.

After a few years Sydney and Charlie were able to follow their father and mother to the stage.

They attained success in juvenile parts and Charlie toured Europe and twice came to the United States.

During the second visit he attracted attention of the motion picture industry and the road to millions was opened.

Boys Give Comfort

The boys established their mother in comfort in London and later had her join them in the west. In California she received every luxury. Nurses and physicians tried to aid her and the fight to rebuild her mind was believed near success.

The federal government several years ago charged her with overstaying the time of her entry permit and steps were taken to

deport the mother of the celebrities. The sons, however, signed affidavits that Mrs. Chaplin's condition was improving and obtained renewal of her bond. The bond was renewed again only a month ago.

Charlie at Bedside

Mrs. Chaplin was removed to Glendale hospital two weeks ago when an internal disorder became serious and for ten hours before her death was in a state of coma.

Funeral arrangements were being delayed pending receipt of word from her son in Europe.

Macfadden Man Travels by Air

Using the company's Lockheed-Vega monoplane, James E. Williamson, space buyer for Macfadden Publications, Inc., is making an air tour of 14 key cities for conferences with wholesalers and distributors of the various Macfadden magazines. This is one of the first instances on record where a business concern not directly affiliated with the aircraft industry has used a plane for the regular conduct of its activities.

The plane has been in almost constant service since its acquisition earlier in the year. Just before starting the flight, Mr. Williamson called attention to the fact that Macfadden Publications is using the air in more ways than one. True Story Hour, which it sponsors, having been on the air over the score of stations of the Columbia Broadcasting System every Friday night since the first week in January. The use of the plane in business, he stated, is simply in line with the organization's policy of commercial progress.

Before being tuned up for the present trip, the plane made an international good-will flight to Mexico City, taking up the route that Carranza, the Mexican ace who was claimed by a storm on his return trip, had started to fly home over. On his Mexican trip the machine carried Zoe Beckley, one of the organization's feature writers, who visited Carranza's mother.

Prior to the Mexican trip, Bernard Macfadden, himself, used the plane to cover the national democratic convention at Houston, for the corporation's newspapers.

Light Protest Is Referred to C. of C.

With 66 signatures affixed, the petition protesting the existing plan for undertaking the city lighting system, was formally received Monday night by the city council. With hardly any comment the petition was referred to the chamber of commerce.

"If," said Mayor Watters today, "nothing is done to counteract this petition before September 17—the date on which protests will be considered—this petition will definitely knock out the lighting improvement, for the time being at least. The project was initiated by the chamber of commerce, so we referred the petition to that body with the hope that they could do something to insure the success of this municipal undertaking."

The proposed light system includes 13 blocks—from Second to Eleventh on Main street; and from Main to Oak street on Eleventh. Benefitted property holders have agreed to pay for the original installation, but the 66 petitioners hold that the city at large should pay for the maintenance and operation.

Under the present plan the property holders would pay for the operation and maintenance.
