SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29. (U P)—Hollywood fought hard today to down Portland 3 to 2 and maintain a two-game lead over Sacramento in the race for first place in the Pacific Coast League.

The Solons held their pace by smothering on 13 hits off Pitt and Weatherby, Los Angeles twirlers, while Rachac, for Sacramento, allowed eight scattered blows and won his game, 6 to 2.

San Francisco, third position club, dropped another notch behind the leaders when Oakland administered the second drubbing of the series, 13 to 5. Two big innings, the sixth and the seventh, gave the Oaks 11 runs to work on.

Three scores made in the first inning carried Hollywood through a grim battle with the Beavers. Ernie Nevers, the former Stanford collegian, turned in one of the best pitching exhibitions of his career today. Burke Wins Fast Handicap
Match From Bull Montana

Henry Burke, the pride of Pelican City, proved victorious in his match with Bull Montana after 26 minutes and 50 seconds of wrestling here last night. The semi-final between Roland Warren of Copco and Lefty Johnson of Bonanza ended in a draw after 20 minutes of wrestling. In the opener Harold Bellows won a one-fall match from Red Reddy, a local amateur, in 15 minutes of rough grappling.

Bull Montana, the Hollywood movie sheik, was unable to live up to advance notices and throw Henry Burke twice in one hour to win his match. Burke, about 20 pounds lighter and much faster than his powerful opponent, was too smart for the Bull. Montana won the first fall of the match with an arm bar and body scissors after 22 minutes and 35 seconds of grappling in one of the toughest contests ever held here.

Burke tried to put a toe-hold on the Bull but Montana broke this hold time and again, although he was punished severely.

The second and deciding fall went to Burke when he successfully pinned his adversary's shoulders to the mat in 4 minutes and 15 seconds after the first fall with a double wrist lock.

In winning this match against the great handicap of weight and strength, Burke looked good and proved his ability to all the fans.

Roland Warren and Lefty Johnson wrestled 20 minutes to a draw in a fast, hard bout. Neither man was able to climb a deciding hold on his opponent. The time limit was up with no decided advantage either way. Weight was 145 pounds.

Harold Bellows threw Frank Reddy, a local amateur, in less than 15 minutes of wrestling. The match was about even up until Bellows pinned Reddy to the mat.

The events went off before a good crowd and were well received, with plenty of excitement reigning in the main event. Immediately after the match, Bull Montana left for his home in Glendale, Calif.

Giants Lose Game
To Boston Braves

Ethel Hertle Wins
Wrigley's Women's
Marathon Swim

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 29. (U P)—Ethel Hertle of New York led a field of 51 women swimmers to the finish line today in the \$15,000 Wrigley Marathon race along a ten-mile Lake Ontario course.

Olive Gatterdam of Seattle was second and Ruth Towers of Denver was third.

Miss Hertle will receive \$10,000 in prize money and \$5,000 will be divided between the other three leaders.

Winners Time Given
The winner's time was 5 hours and 35 minutes. Miss Gatterdam was five minutes behind her.

The swim started at 10 a. m., with Miss Gertrude Ederle, the first woman to swim the English channel, the favorite. About 50,000 persons witnessed the start.

Miss Hertle took a lead after the first lap was ended, ending the lap in an hour and 35 minutes, 26 seconds. The line up at the end of the lap was about like that at the finish, with Miss Gatterdam pressing the leader closely.

Gertrude Ederle Sixth
The other positions shifted as the race continued but the 16-year-old Seattle girl fought her way to second place in the end. She was virtually unknown in swimming circles.

The first six to finish the long swim were:
Miss Hertle, 5 hours, 34½ minutes, first; Miss Gatterdam, 5 hours, 37 minutes, second; Miss Towers, 6 hours, 1 minute, third; Jane Thomas, 6 hours 12 minutes, fourth; Mrs. Anna Benoit, 6 hours, 17 minutes, 40 seconds, fifth; Gertrude Ederle, 6 hours, 23 minutes and 40 seconds, sixth.

Miss Ederle's decisive defeat was the outstanding upset of the race.

The prize money will be divided as follows: Miss Hertle, \$10,000; Miss Gatterdam, \$5,000; Miss Towers, \$1,000; Miss Thomas, \$500 and Mrs. Benoit, \$400.

The five leaders will be eligible to compete in the men's 15-mile world championship swim next Wednesday.

COLLINS WINS TWO
TORONTO, Aug. 29. (U P)—Rip Collins, former major league pitcher, accomplished the iron man stunt today by pitching the Toronto Leafs to a double victory over the Reading Keystones, 2 to 0 and 4 to 1. Collins' feat was made all the more remarkable by the fact that he allowed only three hits in 16 innings. He gave Reading but one hit in the first game, but allowed two hits in the seventh inning afterdark.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29. (U P)—Dismissal of George E. "Hard-Boiled" Golding as chief of the special prohibition agent unit was reported today as the investigation of the shooting of Merle Adams by dry raiders under Golding's command got under way.

Harry M. Dangler, confidential aid to Dr. James R. Doran, federal prohibition enforcement chief, arrived in Chicago today to make a special investigation of the recent activities of the Golding squad. The squad has been held responsible for two shootings while conducting raids here in recent months.

Golding will be succeeded as head of the raiding unit here by Alexander G. Jamies, former assistant prohibition administrator under E. C. Yellowley, according to reports at the federal building.

Orders to prohibition agents to cease reckless shooting during raids were made simultaneously with the arrival here of Dangler.

GIRL WITHOUT COUNSEL
NEW YORK, Aug. 29. (U P)—Mary A. Arewichla, 15-year-old school girl, today pleaded not guilty to a charge of first degree murder, in general sessions court. She is charged with killing Saverio Pantellino, 59. The child charged he had attacked her. She was without counsel, her lawyer having refused to handle her case when he found she could not arrange the fees.

Warner Brothers' Merger
To First National Hinted

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 29. (U P)—When the school bells ring throughout the nation, the hum of renewed industry will be heard in Hollywood and variations, sometimes enforced, will end for all the actors and actresses.

The advent of September is expected to see considerable activity. Most of the producers have completed preparations for filming pictures with sound synchronization.

Picture Taking Hushed
The preliminary work, in main, consisted of hushing up the business of making pictures, that there might be no extraneous noises.

Soon the industry will be engaged in the big job of leading the lessons of the talkies and of studying their three R's—resonance, rendition and retakes.

Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer has just finished installation of the necessary concrete stages, with pillars embedded in rubber and a big recording building.

The studio plans Monday to start on an extensive schedule of sound pictures, with 6,500 square feet of floor space prepared for the work.

Merger Removed
Activities at the First National lot have almost completely stopped and a persistent rumor is heard in Hollywood that they will be resumed after a great film merger has been completed.

Warner brothers is expected to become associated with First National. William Fox is reported to own 25 percent of the First National stock, and with his huge chain of theaters, the merger, if it is completed, will indeed be gigantic.

Joseph Kennedy, resigned president of First National and a chief executive of the Orpheum circuit, is said to be in New York.
