## Kelley Defense Rests Case, Judge Presents Views

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12. (U. P.)—The defense of Leo P. Kelley, accused of the murder of Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, rested its case tonight, at the conclusion of an extra session of court.

Mrs. Grace Brown, former negro maid at the home, was the last witness called. Her testimony was prohibited due to its remoteness and the defense immediately rested.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12. (U. P.)—In an effort to hasten close of the trial of Leo P. Kelley, accused of the murder of his sweetheart, Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, a night session of court was ordered tonight by trial Judge Fletcher Bowron.

Today the jurist curtailed defense efforts with a statement of his views concerning the case.

"The court is convinced that the deceased came to her death by criminal injury," Judge Bowron said. "It is ridiculous to theorize that this woman was about to die anyway."

"Whoever placed those marks on her body," he said, referring to scores of cuts and bruises, "is just as guilty of her death as though she were in normal health. The only hypothesis for the defense is that someone else killed Mrs. Mellus."

The judge sustained prosecution objections to efforts of the defense to show that Mrs. Mellus might have died from a fall and to show that her heart was in a weakened condition from drinking.

Deputy District Attorney Clifford Thoms and P. J. Piretti, one of his investigators, must appear in court Monday to show cause why they should not be held for contempt, following charges they had attempted to intimidate a defense witness. Judge Bowron signed the order tonight.

## Three Killed in Biplane Crash

OAKLAND, Calif., Sept. 12. (U. P.)—Three persons were killed here late today when a biplane in which they were riding crashed to the ground in the residential district.

The dead were Clyde T. Berry, 30, Alameda, pilot, T. A. Wallace, 25, Oakland, and his sister, Jessie, 14, passengers.

The trio had taken off from Oakland airport a short time before in a Travelair biplane. John Fitzer, police officer, witnessed the accident and said the plane had side slipped.

Other witnesses said the craft went into a tail spin. The victims were all dead when they were taken into the Emergency hospital. An immediate investigation was promised by the coroner's office.

As the biplane tumbled through the air it threatened a bungalow but missed the structure by a few feet, landing in a vacant lot. Mechanics were called from Oakland airport at once to clear away the wreckage.

## Al Smith Backer Leads in Georgia

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 12. (U. P.)—Congressman Leslie Steele, of the Fifth district, candidate for renomination in today's democratic primary in Georgia, went into the lead over William D. Upshaw, opponent of Governor Alfred E. Smith, on the basis of incomplete returns late tonight.

Steele was leading in four of the five counties of the district, giving him a county unit vote of 16 to 2 for Upshaw. Returns from Atlanta, Upshaw's home, and Decatur, Steele's home, had not been completed late tonight.

Gov. L. G. Hardman, seeking renomination, appeared certain of winning over State Senator E. D. Rivers on incomplete returns.

The vote was: Hardman, 23, 229; Rivers, 18,991.

## Woman's Party Endorses Hoover

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12. (U. P.)—The national woman's party announced tonight it had decided at a conference this afternoon to support the republican presidential ticket because "these are the only ones whose election offers any hope to the movement for equal rights between men and women."

"It is not possible to support the democratic presidential nominees," a resolution said, "because he opposes equal rights for women in industry and has had a long record, during his career as governor, of opposition to equal industrial opportunity for women and has actively sponsored laws handicapping women in earning their livelihood."
