## Rickard Plans Seven Title Bouts

NEW YORK, Sept. 20, (UP)—Seven world's championship boxing bouts are planned for Madison Square Garden this winter by Tex Rickard, the promoter made known today.

The first title bout of the fall season will be held September 28, when Tony Canzoneri, Brooklyn Italian, defends his featherweight championship against Andre Routis of France.

The other six title bouts Rickard will attempt to promote follow:

Light heavyweight—Tommy Loughran and Jack Delaney

Middleweight—Mickey Walker and Rene De Vos.

Welterweight—Joe Dundee and Jack Thompson.

Lightweight—Sammy Mandell and the winner of the three-cornered elimination between Tommy Grogan, Joe Glick and Jimmy McLarnin.

Bantamweight—Bushy Graham and Al Brown.

Flyweight—Corporal Izzy Schwartz and Frankie Genaro.

A match between Loughran and Walker, the 175-pound and 160-pound champions, respectively, also is in the offing if the New York state athletic commission will permit Walker to come in over the middleweight limit.

## Delaney Wins Over Tassi in Eleventh

EBBETS FIELD, BROOKLYN, Sept. 20, (UP)—Jack Delaney, former light heavyweight champion, returned to the ring for the first time since his one-round knockout at the hands of Jack Sharkey last April, and knocked out Nando Tassi of Italy in the eleventh round of their scheduled 15-round bout tonight, before 10,000 persons.

Referee Eddie Forbes stepped between the fighters after 25 seconds in the eleventh round, awarding the fight to Delaney on a technical knockout.

Delaney had Tassi down twice before the bout was stopped. Tassi rushed in the first round after Delaney landed with a punishing left and as Delaney stepped back the Italian half-slipped down for a count of eight.

Tassi went down from a left uppercut in the ninth round, but was up without a count.

Tassi was no match for the clever Bridgeport boxer at any period of the fight. Delaney evidently came into the ring in perfect condition.

Dr. Baldwin examined Tassi after the bout and announced that he suffered a ruptured and lacerated blood vessel on the nose.

Tassi did not win a round, but in the fourth and seventh traded punches with Delaney, and once had the former 175-pound champion backed onto the ropes and ducking for cover.

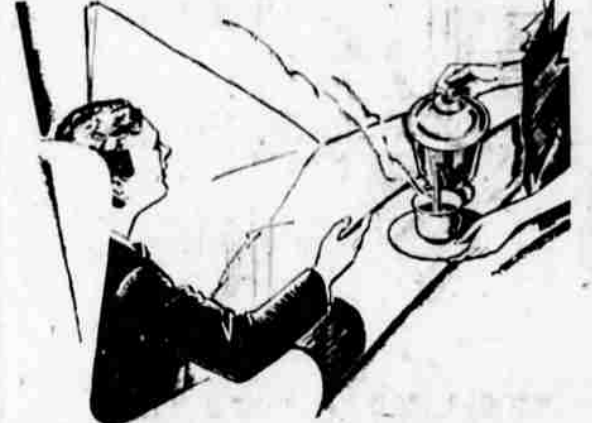
