

Stanford Leaves On Edge for Game With Webfooters

FALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 4. (UP)—Stanford University's football team, rated as one of the strongest in the Pacific Coast conference, left here late today for Eugene, Ore., to meet the University of Oregon Saturday in the first conference tilt of the two squads.

There were 31 regulars in the party that departed, including all who were hurt in the game with the Olympic Club last Saturday except Johnny Preston, an end.

The Cardinals were on edge for the encounter, their scouts having reported that Oregon is stronger this season than had been expected. They are due to arrive in Eugene Friday noon. Stanford was defeated by the Olympic Club Saturday, 12 to 6.

Highlights of Game Told By Writer For United Press

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Oct. 4. (UP)—Using baseball bats made out of crutches and liniment to chloroform the St. Louis Cardinals batters, the supposedly crippled New York Yankees fought their ailments today and conquered the National League champions in the opening game of the 1928 world series.

Fast Balls Dazzle
The Cardinals battling order resembled convalescents' row as Walter Hoyt, a Brooklyn undertaker, shot his fast ball past them lining after lining until it resembled a little white pea from a distant spot in the gigantic stadium.

Hobbling around on one leg, Babe Ruth alone made as many hits as the Cardinals' entire team, and scored one more run. Still favoring his injured knee, Ruth, hammered out two doubles and a single, and scored two runs.

Only "Sunny Jim" Bottomley, the Cardinals' hard hitting first baseman, and George Harper, veteran right fielder, were able to solve Hoyt's delivery for hits. Bottomley hammered a long run into the right field bleachers in the seventh inning for the Cardinals' only run and added a single after two were down in the ninth. Harper set the first hit off Hoyt, a single to center in the fifth.

Where Were Cripples?
The Cardinals entered the game heavy favorites and expected to find the Yankees all ready to topple from their lofty perch as monarchs of the baseball world.

The Cardinals looked for cripples and found a team of hard playing, grim-fighting stalwarts unimpaired of physical handicaps.

The Yankees may have need of wheelchairs to help their cripples onto the field before the game. But the Cardinals certainly had better use for them to help their invalid hitters off the field after the game.

Utterly helpless before Hoyt's destructive pitching, only the brave pitching of Little, Billy Sherdel saved the Cardinals from a possible rout.

The Yankees made but four hits off Sherdel until he was taken out for a pinch hitter in the eighth, but those four hits resulted in bases and meant three runs.

Sherdel's Jinx Returns
Sherdel's old jinx of 1926 came back to haunt him today as the game little lefthander watched another brilliantly pitched contest slip from his grasp. The Yankee beat Sherdel twice by one run in 1926.

It was the Babe's day. The interest of 61,425 fans gravitated in the direction of the round Ruth. Not since he hit three home runs in one game of the 1926 series has he had such a day filled with laurels as he had this day.

The Babe revelled in all his glory and was as happy as a school kid seeing his first world series game. Instead of a veteran playing in his ninth world series, he made the first hit of the game and series, a double to right center in the first inning and limped home on Gehrig's double to right, scoring the first run of the game and series.

In going into second after his hit, Babe made a funny little trick slide, as if he had never hooked a bag before, but he really was favoring his injured knee.

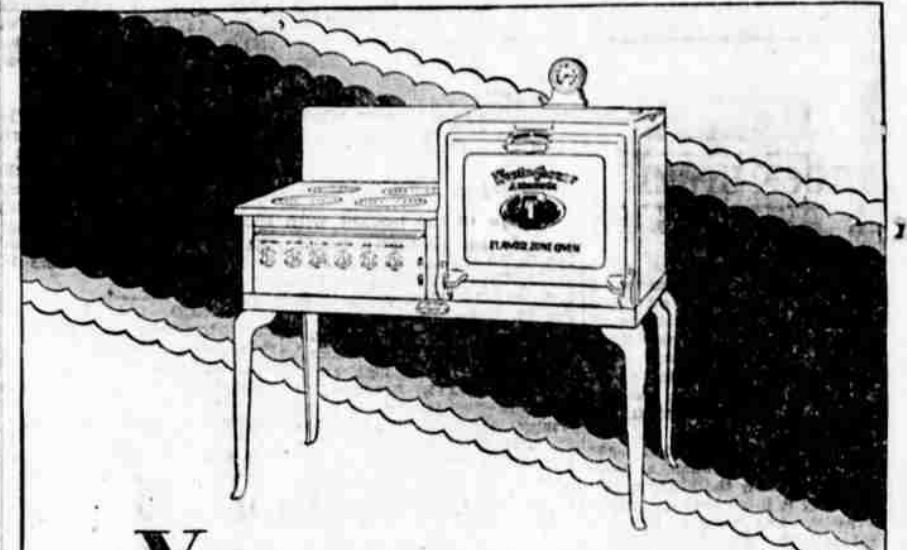
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
