The department includes a credit office under the personal supervision of Mr. Moe, assisted by Lyle Hynon Stewart, who will serve in the capacity of shopping credit director, following out a plan inaugurated in the largest stores of the country several years ago.

Mrs. Stewart has recently returned to Klamath Falls from Marshfield, and for the past five years she has been employed on the newspapers, both there and here, in the editorial department. Mrs. Stewart will be in charge of the work both in Klamath Falls and Klamath county.

Teachers of Klamath county, 128 in all, have been extended a personal greeting by Mr. Moe this season, and the benefits of the new credit system offered to them explained.
