

Washington Will Meet Montana, Few Grid Games Slated

PORTLAND, Oct. 12. (UP)—One conference and four non-conference games will share the attentions of Pacific northwest football fans Saturday afternoon. University of Washington meets the Grizzlies pack from the University of Montana at Seattle in the lone conference tilt.

The Huskies will enter their first conference game this season with a backfield considerably weakened by the loss of Thurlie Thornton, promising half, who was injured in the Whitman game last week. However, the return of Sam Kratz, veteran center, to the line has bolstered the confidence of Coach Bagshaw, and indications point to a hard battle with the Grizzlies.

Washington Weak

Washington State downed Montana last week by a score of 26 to 6, but Montana showed a strong defense that repeatedly stopped the States. Washington eked out a 6 to 0 win over Whitman college last week, and the week before defeated small Pacific university by the large score of 42 to 0, but in neither game did the Huskies show any semblance of the form that they had last season. Washington is the favorite to win, but the odds are so slight that it is practically a toss-up.

Sinclair was unable to state who would start for Klamath, but if the second string is started in the first quarter the varsity will be on hand to save the game if the second stringers get in trouble.

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2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt

4 tablespoons Crisco

Sift together three times flour, baking powder and salt. Work in Crisco with the tips of fingers. Add milk. Roll 1/4 inch thick, cut in small rounds, brush one-half of them with melted Crisco and place another round on top. Brush with milk. Bake in well-Criscoed pans in a hot oven (475°F.) 25 minutes. Remove from oven and immediately lift the top off each biscuit and put a teaspoon of orange marmalade in the center of each. Replace top and serve while hot. Makes 12 to 25 biscuits.
