Brakeman Killed By Runaway Cars

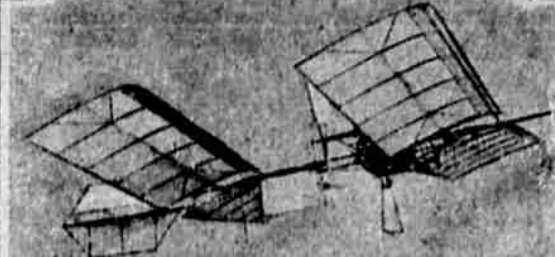
As the three logging cars sped through a cut with high banks on either side.

(Continued From Page One) shiner sidesteps a revenue tax of about \$100 and takes the risk of paying a penalty of \$1,000, and if he colors his "white mule" to look like red whiskey he must pay \$500 additional for not having paid the tax required of a rectifier.

To Check Violators For some time all violators convicted under the Volstead act have been thus assessed, but it was left for Dr. J. M. Doran, the present prohibition commissioner, to apply the penalties to the violator convicted in the district and justice and police courts.

Hazeltine says that as a rule they settle as their convictions stare them in the face and they have no defense. However, he says, that ninety per cent of them are broke, showing, he says, how false is the general idea that bootlegging pays.

He praises the Oregon state law as the best prohibition law in the United States and the provision for state prohibition agents to act under the sheriff's office makes it unnecessary for federal agents to work in that capacity and they can be saved for conspiracy, abatement and diversion of industrial alcohol cases.

Wind Blows Trees Over State Roads

The high wind which swept through southern Oregon Thursday brought grief to the motorists on the Ashland-Klamath Falls and The Dalles-California highways it was stated by many yesterday when they arrived after finding difficulty in circumventing trees which had blown across the highways in large numbers.

About 25 trees laid across the highway between this city and Ashland, it was learned, and all day Friday employees of the highway departments of Klamath and Jackson counties were cutting the trees into movable chunks and hauling them to the side of the road.

Motorists who drove in from Bend reported that about 11 trees were across The Dalles-California highway. These were also being cleared away.

(Continued From Page One) closets all add to the conveniences. A strictly modern oil burning furnace, with individual regulation for heat of the separate rooms which can be adjusted in the furnace room, has been installed. All pipes leading from the furnace have been painted black.

A hot room has been built in the freight room to handle perishable fruit during cold weather. The freight room itself is large and roomy with sliding doors allowing access to the freight siding close to the building.

On the north side of the freight shed another track has been put in with a large drive-way which will be graveled, for convenience of teams and trucks unloading from cars. A passenger platform will allow customers of the road to enter the train direct from the platform to the coaches.
