

Meetings Called To Discuss Relief Tax Plan for State

SALEM, Oct. 12. (UP)—The bank tax problem arising out of the recent federal court decision exempting national banks from the payment of state taxes is to be discussed at two conferences to be held next week.

The first of these conferences will be held at the office of Governor I. L. Patterson here next Wednesday, and will be attended by members of the state property tax relief commission, the state banking board and representatives of the State Bankers' association.

The second conference will substitute representatives of bond houses, mortgage companies and building and loan associations for the bankers and will be held on the following day. Notices of the conferences have been sent out by John Carlin of Medford, chairman of the tax relief committee. A. A. Smith, of Baker, as chairman of the committee handling this particular phase of the taxation problem, will preside.

Three alternatives by which the bank taxation problem may be met are suggested by Carlin in his notice. The first of these contemplates no attempt at taxation of bank stocks until the federal law can be changed so as to bring national banks under the state tax. French Submarine With 43 On Board Is Rammed, Sinks

PARIS, Oct. 12. (UP)—Rammed by the Greek steamer Ekaterina Coulanderis when she was cruising 27 miles off Vigo, Spain, the French submarine Ondine, with 42 men on board, was buried under 7,560 feet of water, the ministry of marine announced tonight.

All men were given up as lost, as the submarine was built to withstand a depth of only 1300 feet and undoubtedly was crushed when she sank, the ministry said.

The collision occurred at 11 p. m., October 3, the Greek vessel reported when she docked, but at that time it was not believed the water was more than 260 feet deep where the submarine sank. French warships, which reached the spot today, reported the depth of the water where it was ascertained the Ondine and the Ekaterina Coulanderis collided.

Officials said that when the Ondine dropped below her calculated depth, she probably was flattened out by the pressure. They expressed the opinion that the Greek vessel, which reported the accident after the collision when she docked at Rotterdam, should have waited on the spot until daylight to seek survivors or wreckage, making positive identification possible.

Robinson Goes Through City on Way to Portland

Bound for Seattle to deliver a speech on behalf of the democratic ticket, Joseph T. Robinson, United States senator from Arkansas and democratic vice-presidential nominee, passed through the city last night on train No. 16. The train arrived at 10:17 and was here for 15 minutes, but due to the lateness of the hour and the fact that Robinson was exhausted from campaigning in California, he did not deliver a speech from the platform of his car.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Oct. 12. (UP)—Light wines and beer as a possibility under changes advocated by Governor Alfred E. Smith were specifically mentioned here today by Senator Joseph T. Robinson, democratic nominee for vice-president. The topic was discussed informally while the senator answered questions. "Governor Smith," he said, "favors a change that will scientifically fix the alcoholic content that is intoxicating and permitting the states to give their own content within that act by the federal law. This will permit very light wines and beer to states that desire them."

The day was spent by Senator Robinson in the longest jump of the political campaign which will make him the first of the national candidates to tour the far northwest. Merchant marine, farm relief and business all will be discussed in this territory, which Robinson is invading in an attempt to capture republican votes.

Passing through Portland Saturday morning, he will go on to Washington. A station speech at Tacoma and a prepared address at Seattle Saturday night are on the program. Mount Ranier will be visited Sunday, and Monday he will return to Portland to speak there.

Young Lincoln disappeared September 1, 1926, and relatives have heard nothing from him since. He lived three miles from the Northcott chicken ranch, where the youthful alleged fiend is said to have mistreated and killed a number of lads.

Fraternity House At O. S. C. Robbed

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Oct. 12. (UP)—Early morning burglars entered six men's fraternity houses here Friday, ransacked about 30 rooms while students were asleep, and made away with loot valued at about \$1,000. Most of the loot consisted of watches, money, jewelry, brief cases and clothing. Sixty students suffered loss.

Steamer Rushes To Aid Burning Freighter, Crew

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Oct. 12. (UP)—The federal radio tonight reported that a fire aboard the British freighter Trojanstar had been extinguished. There were unofficial reports of loss of life, but shipping men said that definite word would have to come from the Admiral Line offices in Portland, Ore.

The Admiral Line is agent for the ship. The Trojanstar was reported in distress off the northern California coast, but the latest reports indicated the ship had been saved.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12. (UP)—A dramatic appeal for aid flashed out of the air to the Mackay Radio company's marine station here Friday night when the steamer Trojanstar, en route from San Pedro, Calif., to Vancouver, B. C., flashed an S. O. S. that her oil tanks were in flames.

The Trojanstar's call for help came at 6:46 p. m. and she gave her position as 40 miles north and 47 miles west of Cape Mendocino, along the coast of northern California.

The first message of distress stated that the crew, at that moment were taking to the boats. Messages, however, flashed later, indicated that the crew, or a portion of the men at least, were standing by, fighting the fire with steam.

Still later, the operator on the Trojanstar sent word that the steamer McKiki, 30 miles north, was responding to the distress signals and proceeding to her aid. The operator on the Trojanstar then sent word that other craft were on the way to her aid. The Trojanstar is owned by the Blue Star Line.
