

Seals Take Third Series Game From Sacramento, 7 to 4

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Oct. 12. (UP)—The third contest of the Pacific coast baseball league's pennant series was decided in the last two innings here today, when the San Francisco Seals scored five runs to beat Sacramento 7 to 4.

It was the second victory of the seven game series for the Seals. They had been one run behind Sacramento for four innings, but six hits they made in the eighth and ninth innings gave them the victory.

Gould of Sacramento and Thurston of San Francisco, pitched the entire game.

The Seals, as usual, took an early lead, Jolley's single in the first inning scoring Averill and Suhr. A double by Backer and

a single by Sheely in the last of the third inning gave Sacramento three runs. Then four innings of scoreless ball was played.

A single to center by Sprinz, Seal catcher, in the eighth, was actually the decisive blow of the game, as it scored Suhr and Jolley, after Pinelli had crossed home plate on Suhr's double. These three runs gave the Seals a lead that was never overcome, but they added two more in the ninth when Averill's double scored Johnson and Pinelli.

The Senators threatened in the eighth, but only made one run. The teams left here tonight for San Francisco, where they will play Saturday and Sunday.

W.S.C. Eleven Will Play California On Berkeley Field

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 12. (UP)—Two of the strongest teams of the Pacific coast conference will meet in Memorial stadium here Saturday. The University of California and Washington State college, two of the four undefeated teams in the circuit, will battle in the important contest.

To Pound Center
The Cougars arrived here today, prepared to pound at the mediocre central portion of the California line in renewing the attempt to carry the conference title to the Pacific northwest.

It will be California's first conference game, but the Golden Bears have conquered two powerful squads, Santa Clara and St. Mary's, in practice games, and were slight favorites to down the northerners. The Cougars won their first conference game last Saturday, defeating Montana, 26 to 6.

California to Pass

The Bears have three separate backfield combinations, but Coach Nibs Price had not announced tonight which one would start. It was believed, however, that it will be Leland Eisan at quarter, Benjamin Lom and Stanley Barr at halfbacks, and Chas. Schmidt at fullback.

The visitors probably will start Porter Luhnart, Dan Horan, Ted Rowher and Hein in the backfield.

The middle part of the Washington State line is believed to be better than that of California, so the Washington State backfield men will probably start for the flanks and then cut in for the center of the line. California is expected to use a passing attack to save its plungers and linemen for the important conflict with U.S.C. here a week from tomorrow.

The Bears will also be at the disadvantage of trying to keep a few of their secrets hidden from U.S.C. scouts, but may have to uncover them before the end of the game.

The contest is expected to draw a record crowd for the coast Saturday, as it is considered the most important on the schedule.

U.S.C. Will Meet St. Mary's Gridmen

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12. (UP)—University of Southern California gridiron mentors and players today expected anything at the hands of the St. Mary's college, Oakland, when they meet at the coliseum Saturday.

A crowd of about 40,000 was expected to see the game.

The St. Mary's team, member of the far-western conference, and not the Pacific coast group of largest colleges, annually brings worry to all foes, and today the Los Angeles campus dope was that U.S.C. will be glad to win by a touchdown.

The Oakland team will not arrive in Los Angeles until Saturday morning, a few hours before the game, an unusual performance.

Few Important Coast Tilts Today; Navy-Notre Dame Game Attracts Attention

The eve of the first important Saturday of the 1928 football season found the nation's attention largely focused upon the middlewest.

Although each had been defeated, the game at Soldiers' field between the Navy and Notre Dame promises to provide the most colorful, and possibly the most dramatic spectacle of the day, while on four mid-western gridirons, campaigning for the championship of the "big ten" begins.

Yale Meets Georgia
In the east, Yale encounters Georgia, the college team best remembered from last season for having spoiled the Bulldog's chances of achieving an unbroken string of victories.

The battles for the western conference title, which start Saturday, find eight of the contenders, three with high championship hopes, swinging into action.

Whereas before the 1928 season opened, Illinois was rated a certain winner among the "big ten" teams, the past fortnight has proved that the race is an open one. In addition to Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Ohio State are pointing towards the championship.

Chicago Interested
The Navy and Notre Dame are headed nowhere as far as national honors of 1928 are concerned, yet nearly 120,000 spectators are expected at Soldier's field. Chicago is ablaze with the colors of the contenders, and save for the unseasonably warm weather, the city has something of the atmosphere of championship football.

The "big ten" engagements Saturday:

Iowa vs. Chicago at Chicago.
Ohio State vs. Northwestern at Evanston.
Purdue vs. Minnesota at Minneapolis.
Indiana vs. Michigan at Ann Arbor.

Wisconsin and Illinois, alone among the conference elevens, are engaging weak outsiders in games which do not count towards the championship.

Iowa, Ohio State, Minnesota, Iowa, Ohio State and Minnesota are up against tests described as acid. Each must come through with a victory to retain its title ambitions. Each is favored to win by a small margin.

The Hawkeyes will present Mayes McLain, their celebrated Indian ball carrier, against the Maroon at Chicago, while at Minneapolis "Pete" Welch, who has been saved for the first conference game of the year following his baseball injuries, will go into action against the Gophers. Welch will be remembered nationally as the young man who assisted so materially when Purdue overwhelmed Harvard last season.

Michigan Thought Weak
Ohio State, crippled by the loss of Kruksamp, Kries and Huston, worked out at Dyke stadium Friday in preparation for the game with Northwestern. The Buckeyes are favorites over the purple, relying in no small measure upon the generalship and all-around ability of Allen Holman, sophomore quarterback.

Michigan is not expected to figure strongly in the conference race this season, and Indiana is

favorable to open the "big ten" race with a victory.

Princeton Strong
Three southern football teams invade the eastern sector, with the Yale-Georgia game at New Haven standing out as the principal attraction. A badly crippled Yale team will attempt to revenge a 14-0 defeat suffered at the hands of Georgia last year.

The North Carolina Tarheels play Harvard at Cambridge, and the University of Virginia team meets Princeton at Princeton. Harvard is crippled, but Princeton is rapidly shaping up as the east's most dangerous team.

A crowd of 50,000 is expected to see the New York U. Fordham game at the Polo Grounds, New York.

Stanford to Play U.C.L.A. Grid Team

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 12. (UP)—Stanford university's football team was an outstanding favorite tonight to defeat the University of California at Los Angeles in the southerner's inaugural conference game here Saturday.

Apparently the introduction of the Bruins to the big coast circuit will be similar to the introduction of a freshman, because Stanford seems to have one of the most powerful elevens on the coast this year.

The southerners are undaunted, however, and have been saving their star back, Joe Fleming, to teach the veterans of the conference a few tricks.

Three regulars of the Cardinals are on the hospital list. They are Frank Wilton, half, Artman, tackle, and Harder, end.

Johnson Wanted To Boss Senators

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12. (UP)—Walter Johnson, former veteran pitcher for the Washington Senators, will be signed to manage the club if he can obtain his release from Newark of the International league, which he managed last year. President Clark Griffith of the Senators said today.

"I certainly would like to have Johnson if he can obtain his release from Newark," Griffith said. "I talked the matter over with Johnson during the world series and he is ready to take the post if his release can be effected."

Griffith indicated, however, that he would take no part in any negotiations Johnson may have with Paul Block, owner of the Newark club, to obtain his release. Johnson has a two-year contract to manage Newark.

Kewpie Riley to Fight J. Francis

Announcement was made Friday afternoon that Johnnie Francis, knock-out king of southern and central Oregon, would meet "Kewpie" Riley, Portland lightweight, in the next ten round main event in Klamath Falls.

"Date of the card will be announced within the next few days," said Joe Hickerstaff. "In Riley, I believe I have at last found the man who can give Francis a run for his money. Riley, as any fight fan knows, is a main eventer of no mean capacity and is likely to get over Johnnie if he doesn't watch out."

Francis has fought three rounds in Klamath in as many main events. Each fight ended in the first round when Francis dropped his opponent for a neat knock-out.

Hickerstaff is attempting to arrange a six round semi-windup between Chuck Martin of Klamath, former University of Washington student and Gene O'Grady, Ashland windmill. Both boys are middle-weights and hard fighters.
