

Huskies Arrive To Meet Oregon Team in Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 19. (UP)—Headed by Coach Knack Hagshaw, 35 stalwart Huskies from the University of Washington arrived in Portland Friday afternoon and immediately went through a fast light workout on the Multnomah civic stadium grounds, where they meet the University of Oregon in their second conference game Saturday.

A large crowd met the Huskies at the union station and as the gridmen stepped from the train it was apparent that every man was in splendid condition, despite reports that half the team was suffering from a mild attack of altitude poisoning.

Plenty of action is expected in this contest. The Washington offensive, built around Chuck Carroll, one of the outstanding backs in the conference, has down-rolled all opposition so far and the Huskies are determined to make Oregon no exception.

McKwan has made several changes in his backfield. Kitzmiller, a big, powerful sophomore, on whom the Oregon men are depending for most of Oregon's yardage, will start at half. He is a triple threat man, fast for his build and one of the best backfield men developed at Oregon.

The remainder of the backfield will include Burnell, half, who will direct the team; Gould, full, and Williams, quarter.

Stanford Defeats Idaho by "Steam Roller" Attack, 47-0

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19. (UP)—Stanford university's football team opened up for the first time of the season here today with deceptive reverses and screened forward passes to trounce the University of Idaho, 47 to 0.

The Cardinals started slowly but soon warmed up to their "steam roller" strength.

Stanford had not been expected to win by more than two touchdowns, and in the first quarter it appeared that the northerners would live up to their advance notices and give Stanford a battle. Twice they held the Cardinals for downs when their goal line was seriously threatened.

Then in the second quarter Idaho cracked, and by the fourth period their play had been entirely broken down by the spectacular and amazing attack of the victors.

As a climax Leland "Spud" Lewis, Stanford quarterback, ran 42 yards to the Idaho one-yard line and Houston Rehrig bucked the ball across while Lewis converted for the 17th point as the game ended.

Lewis had scored first in the second quarter on an eight-yard run after reverse. The little quarterback was credited with another touchdown early in the next period with a line back after a 20-yard run by Bill Simkins, fullback. Chuck Smalling jumped into the scoring column then and made the score 20 to 0 at the end of the third quarter.

The final 20 minutes had just started when Lewis raced 19 yards for a touchdown after receiving a short pass from Simkins, and Simkins was given the ball for the next score, a line back. Lewis made his fourth of five touchdowns a few minutes later through right guard. His record was even more impressive

before he converted four touchdowns out of six tries and Captain "Biff" Hoffman made the other.

Besides Lewis, Lud Frentrop, Chuck Smalling and Simkins, usually considered as members of the second string backfield, were outstanding performers.

ORANGEMEN TO PLAY COUGARS

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 19. (UP)—Thirty-two gridmen from Oregon State college arrived here Friday afternoon and went through a light workout as a final preparation for their game Saturday afternoon with Washington State college.

Determined to avenge the 13-6 defeat administered to them by the Oregon Aggies last year, the Cougars have developed an aerial attack with which they hope to offset the smashing line of offensive the visitors are planning to use.

The Aggies arrived with all their veterans except Carl Metten. Twitcheil, stellar half, has not recovered from injuries suffered in the U.S.C. game and will watch the game from the sidelines.

Bucky Harris to Manage Detroit

Joe Bickerstaff, local promoter, has lined up a stellar attraction in these two boys, as Riley is junior lightweight champion of the Pacific coast and has lost only one fight in two years and that one was to Ritchie King, considered best in the northwest at his weight. Riley did not take the count even then until he had been knocked down nine times. Kewpie is managed by Sam Doman, a shrewd handler of fighters, whose motto is "Fighters that Fight."

Francis came to this city unknown and after a couple of fights in which he kayoed his opponent in the first round, he was matched with Phil Bayes, a fighter with over 100 fights and who, up to the time he met Francis, had never taken the count. In this match, Francis kept his reputation by not even letting the fight get to the second round.

Klamath fans have become greatly interested in this fighter, and have begun to ask the question, "How good is Francis?" It is firmly believed an answer to this question will be found in the Riley-Francis match.

The semi-wrap on the card will bring two new men before the fans, Frankie Warnicke of Portland and Harry Johnson of San Francisco. Warnicke is also managed by Doman. Johnson loves a fight and looks great in the gym, according to spectators.

The special event will bring Sam Pilby, fast 128-pounder who defeated the Bend marvel, Billy Breedlove, last Wednesday, and Mike Carr together in the ring. Carr will be remembered as victor when he fought Harold Wright.

Benny Dyson, a newcomer in the city and a recent arrival from New York, takes on Harold Wright, Indian fighter who has trained under Demon Savage and who beat Young Johnson of Bend during the last Chilquin fights. The curtain-raiser will find Rusty Griffith of Klamath Falls meeting Bud Jerry of Chilquin.
