

BASQUE WINNER OVER VON PORAT

Paolino Lands Two Hits To Every One Put Over By Opponent

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Nov. 5. (UP)—Another heavyweight bubble burst before the blundering but capable fists of Paolino and Von Porat tonight when Otto von Porat of Norway was outpointed by Tex Rickard to choose Gene Tunney's successor.

Treated as the hardest hitter among the heavies since Jack Dempsey's day, the Norseman proved decidedly a false alarm, as 15,000 spectators in Madison Square Garden were only too ready to testify.

Whatever hard hitting was done came from the willing but unwieldy gloves of the Basque, who twice sent the former Olympic champion to the canvas.

Paolino, needless to say, was his usual bungling self, but at that he was more than a match for von Porat, who could neither outbox nor outlast him.

With an advantage of 6½ pounds in weight, the Basque was faster on his feet than the Norwegian heavyweight, and landed two effective blows to his opponent's one during the brief ten-round engagement, which went nowhere towards finding a new champion.

Klamath Team Will Play Bend

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Car Materials Aid Lumber Market

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will be much better than the year which is just closing.

One of the brightest spots in the lumber market is the greatly improved outlook for the car material market. Millions of feet of high-grade lumber is bought on the Pacific coast annually for use in the construction of freight cars, and due to the fact that these orders are difficult to execute as compared with other demands taking similar sizes and grades, they bring top prices and the business is attractive to most of the mills. During the past three weeks the inquiry for quotations on car material schedules has been the biggest that it has been in many months and that this will result in heavy buying through the next four months is a foregone conclusion.

Special Grades Being Ordered.
Another gratifying feature of the market recently has been the abundance of cutting orders. All this year, especially during the summer months when the demand for retail yards stock took on momentum and prices made some gains, the volume of timber or cutting orders continued to be sluggish enough so that prices remained flabby and a majority of the inland plants had a difficult time in getting desirable orders of this nature.

Of late there has been enough placements available to meet the needs of a majority of the mills and prices which were unchanged are firm. In this connection it is interesting to note the increasing percentage of small sizes and special grades in cutting orders. The buyers are finding it necessary to come to the fir mills for structural grades which they formerly have been buying in southern pine. Fir manufacturers in characteristic fashion have been slow in getting in step with this new demand but they are at last beginning to realize that by selecting their logs they can produce these high grades of common and realize more money.

This trend to special grades of common is an important step in the evolution of the merchandising of west coast woods, as it means a further refining of the log and in the long run a better average price. The demand from the middle west and eastern retail yards is at present light but steady and on mixed car orders, which represent the bulk of the business, prices have had no appreciable change.

It is not reasonable to expect any improvement in the retail yard demand from the fields served by all-rail shipments until after the middle of this month and then only if the mills take some action which will convince the retailers that there is not going to be an overproduction through the winter.

Cargo Markets Still Overloaded.
The domestic cargo markets lead all others in their weakness. The Atlantic coast buyers are finding it easily possible to fill their needs from unsold accumulations and transit shipments which are arriving unsold and this has resulted in an increase in the shipments to the California water markets, especially San Pedro, where the unsold accumulations on the docks have grown considerably since the middle of October. As a natural consequence there has been some price cutting in California in a futile effort to stimulate buying, with the usual result of stifling. Building permits in the Los Angeles district have fallen considerably below the level of a year ago and there is nothing to justify crowding increased shipment to California for the time being.

The export market is taking another breathing spell. Prices have had no change on the foreign business for several weeks. The pine markets east of the Cascades are holding up in excellent shape. The volume of new business coming to the pine mills has tapered off in about the same proportion that fir has, but fortunately the stocks of seasoned pine are extremely low and the mills are having some trouble taking care of the orders being offered. Pine prices are firm on all grades at the advances put into effect the first of September. The pine mills are going into the winter in excellent condition and there is reason to believe the pine prices will be bid up further before the fall cuts into shipping condition next spring.

The red cedar shingle market is not as firm as it was 30 days ago. The volume of single orders has fallen off as it always does at this season and while the shingle production is yet considerably below normal, it is more than enough to meet the demand. It is rumored that the shingle mills contemplated a production regulation program for the winter months that will make provision for the usual dull period, as shingle prices have come up considerably since the middle of the summer and the producers are anxious to hold this ground which has been so hard to gain.

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ARMY FEARS NOTRE DAME

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. (UP)—The Army fears Notre Dame.

West Point scouts who looked over Rockne's Ramblers in action against Penn State at Philadelphia last week report that the November Notre Dame team is a vastly improved machine over the one which flourished at Madison, Wis., and Atlanta, Ga., in October.

Fred Collins, who fractured his arm in the first game of the season against Loyola (New Orleans) returned to the Notre Dame backfield and played brilliantly with his arm in a plaster cast. He may be able to discard the cast for the Army game here Saturday.

Nieme and Chevigny, first string halfbacks, acquitted themselves well and Joe Carrigan, a third string quarterback from Green Bay, Wis., planned over for the only touchdown.

Many eastern experts believe the Notre Dame-Army game will resolve itself into a battle between Rockne's defense and Red Cagle. If Notre Dame can stop Cagle, then South Bend hopes hang high.

It was Cagle who set off the first explosion under Notre Dame in last year's game with an unexpected 50-yard dash down the sidelines for the first touchdown. Notre Dame never recovered from that dash and Army went on to win 18 to 0.

All of the 50,000 seats at the game, which will be held at Yankee stadium, have been sold for weeks.

writer and editor of the United States Daily of Washington, D. C., the radio news staff will be interpreted by Lawrence for the listener. NBC officials state that in their ambitious election night program, confusing figures will be kept to a minimum and the interpretation of results in various sections of the country will be the paramount object of the service.

The program will continue until the required 266 electoral votes have been obtained by the successful presidential candidate. A musical program will be interspersed with the returns, although election news will take precedence on the national network over even commercial programs being paid for by advertisers.

The United Press was the first news agency to consent to the broadcasting of its returns of a national election. In 1924, WEAF, then the property of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, and a small group of associated stations broadcast the returns of the Coolidge-Davis race as furnished by the United Press.

Four U. P. telegraph wires have been installed in NBC headquarters here for instantaneous delivery of the day's election returns from all parts of the nation.

NORTHCOTT CASE OPENS IN NORTH

Prosecution Ends Work in Extradition of Accused Youth

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 5. (UP)—Sometimes laughing, frequently smiling to acquaintances and continually chewing gum, Gordon Stewart Northcott listened to it. T. Maitland, K. C., counsel for the state of California and Riverside county, disclose to Judge Gayley today the evidence on which the extradition of the accused is sought on a murder charge concerning the disappearance of Nelson and Louis Winslow.

The courtroom was crowded with spectators who followed the gruesome testimony with the closest interest. Many women were present as of previous occasions, and a number of young girls absorbed in the drama which was unfolded before them.

Northcott frequently leaned forward in the prisoner's dock and for the moment would forget to smile.

Conceding that much of the evidence heard by the grand jury of Riverside county was inadmissible, Maitland said that Frank Lyons, Northcott's attorney, could object and he (Maitland) would not press the testimony. However, this seemingly amicable arrangement struck a snag during the introduction of the evidence of James B. Quinn, an investigator employed by the Riverside county sheriff's office, who was a witness before the grand jury.

Lyons strenuously opposed Quinn's answer to the question: "Do you know whether two boys from Pomona disappeared?"

Statement Read
Admitting the answer for what it was worth, Judge Gayley allowed Maitland to read Quinn's statement that a nation-wide search had been made for the missing Winslow brothers.

The evidence of Cyrus George Northcott, father of the accused, was then read. He asserted that he had an altercation with his son, who tried to choke him because he had helped Sanford

Shows Photographs
Sanford said he thought they were about 7 and 10 years old. They were brought to the ranch late one night and locked in the chicken coop, where they were kept for a week and a half and then killed, according to Sanford. Maitland produced a photograph of Northcott with the affidavit of young Clark as identification. It was turned over to Judge Gayley, who ordered the deponent brought before the bench.

After looking intently at Northcott for several minutes, the judge said: "I guess that's good enough."

"I would like to see the signature of my nephew," Northcott asked.

"Speak through your counsel," was the sharp reply from the bench.

Thus the prosecution's presentation of the Winslow case was concluded.

DIES OF INJURY

APPEAL GIVEN IN BROWNLEE CASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5. (UP)—The case of Leslie J. Brownlee, who was lost while climbing Mt. Hood January 1, 1927, and whose relatives to date have been unable to collect accident insurance, was ordered reversed and recommended for further proceedings by the U. S. circuit of appeals today.

The insurance company contended that a \$5,000 policy should not be paid because there was no proof that Brownlee came to his death by accident before the policy expired at noon the day he was lost.

On the day he disappeared, Brownlee, with Al Feyerhead, started up Mt. Hood. About 11 a. m., Brownlee tired and started back. Although an immediate search was made and another followed in the summer, he was never found.

The circuit court of appeals ruled that Joseph and Barbara Brownlee, who seek to collect on the policy, apparently had sufficient grounds to warrant a trial by jury.

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
