## School Students Favor Hoover For President

Herbert Hoover was elected president of the United States by an almost 2 to 1 vote by the students at the Klamath Union high school yesterday. The vote totaled 225 for Hoover and 122 for Smith.

The high school sample ballot election was held under the supervision of the civics classes. Four hundred students were registered and 258 voted at the polls which closed last night. E. C. Vanderpool, civics teacher, was in charge.

Students were instructed not to vote upon any of the state or city measures, since they had not studied them, neither did they vote upon any of the councilmen.

## MAN JAILED IN FURNACE CASE

Contractor Faints in Front of Village Hall in Illinois

LAKE BLUFF, Ill., Nov. 6. (UP)—Two developments, reviving the murder theory, spurred authorities today to renew activity in their investigation of the Lake Bluff "furnace mystery."

Oscar J. Kloor, contractor, and

close friend of Charles W. Hitchcock, who had taught Effie Knaak, furnace victim, elocution, elocution and sales psychology, was taken into custody when he collapsed in front of the village hall. Kloor's name had been mentioned in connection with the death of Miss Knaak, before he collapsed. When doctors were called to attend him he cried out "This is the end. This is the end."

Kloor is married and the father of two children. He had been estranged from his wife, who was called to his bedside from Kenosha, Wis. Authorities today refused to say what their ques-

tioning of Kloor had disclosed, if anything.

An anonymous letter, mailed in Chicago, by a man who called himself a "student in occultism and hypnotism," stated the girl met her death in the furnace when he sought to "purge her memory of Charlie."

"Charlie," authorities said, may be a reference to Hitchcock, who was questioned when Miss Knaak had murmured, "Oh, Hitchcock, oh, Hitchcock, where are you?" The girl before she died said she had burned herself to "purify a spiritual love."
