"Wedding rings," was the verdict. In the second drawer were some receipted bills belonging to Mrs. Caroline Rothstein, the widow. They seemed to prove that Mrs. Rothstein's credit at the better shops was good. There was nothing else in the drawers.

Makes Whoopee Mrs. Keyes, describing herself as a free-lance cloak model, admitted that she had made a little impromptu whoopee with a couple of nice looking men in a room of the Park Central a few hours before Rothstein was shot. Police have identified it as room 349—the supposed murder room. But Mrs. Keyes couldn't remember for sure.

Between 10:20 p. m. and 11 p. m., somebody shot Rothstein in room 349, but Mrs. Keyes said she was in a cabaret at that time.

She had come to New York on a shopping trip and she went back to Chicago to rejoin her husband, Floyd Keyes, a railway brakeman, several days after the shooting, she said.

With the arrival of Mrs. Keyes the police became as mysterious to reporters as the case itself had been to them. Mrs. Keyes was rushed from the train and taken to a hotel. Officials of the police department and the district attorney's office questioned her.

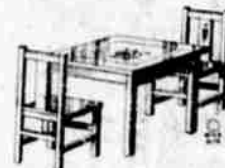
