

U. O. IS FAVORED TO BEAT U.C.L.A.

Webfooters May Run Up Big Score Against Southern Men

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28. (UP)—University of Oregon was a decided favorite here tonight to defeat University of California at Los Angeles Thursday when it makes its first appearance on a southern California gridiron since 1926.

The Webfooters arrived in Pasadena this morning and worked out in the rose bowl, delaying the short trip to Los Angeles until just before the game.

Oregon has its strongest team in the eight seasons that have elapsed since the 1920 showing, when it lost the Pasadena east-west game to Harvard, 7 to 6. In its 1926 conference appearance here Oregon lost to Southern California.

The Bruins have none too strong a team and the northerners were understood to be out to run up a big score in the hope of earning a place on Southern California's schedule next year. Oregon brought 35 players here and all were reported in good shape.

RYE, N. Y., Nov. 28. (UP)—The Stanford football squad arrived here late today and took up quarters at the Westchester-Biltmore Country club to await its intersectional game with Army at Yankee stadium, New York, Saturday. It will be the first eastern appearance of the Stanford eleven.

The squad left Berkeley, Calif., Saturday night after the California game and spent four days and nights in a Pullman. Coach Pop Warner reported the squad in good shape, however, except "for a few colds."

The first workout will be held on the polo field here Thursday morning. In the afternoon the entire squad of 28 players will attend the New York U.-Oregon Aggies game at Yankee stadium. Another brief workout will be held Friday afternoon.

Neither Coach Warner nor Capt. Biff Hoffman would make a prediction on the Stanford-Army game.

EASTERN BALL SEASON CLOSES

Aggies Beat Long Shot in Game Against N.Y.U.

Today

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (UP)—Gridiron wars on the eastern sector end Thanksgiving day.

After tomorrow's skirmishes, only two post-season games—Stanford vs. Army at New York, and Boston college vs. Holy Cross at Boston—remain on the eastern schedule.

Aggies on Schedule

The last big push finds New York university engaging the Oregon Aggies at New York, Pennsylvania and Cornell meeting at Philadelphia, Colgate and Brown battling at Providence, Syracuse and Columbia clashing at New York, Pittsburgh and Penn State playing at Pittsburgh, and West Virginia and Washington and Jefferson lining up at Morristown.

An appropriate end to a topsy-turvy football season would be for the Oregon Aggies, Cornell, Colgate, Columbia, Penn State and W. & J. to topple the favorites.

Cornell, Penn State and W. & J. are not conceded a ghost of a chance. Columbia is rated almost on even terms with Syracuse. Colgate and Brown played a scoreless tie last year and Brown's edge this year is very meagre.

Aggies Long Shot

The Oregon Aggies are the best long shots on the day's schedule. Chick Mehan, smiling little New York university coach, is frank to admit he fears Oregon more than he did Carnegie Tech.

Lassman's Loss Felt

The Violets will be without their giant captain, Al Lassman, whose loss will be felt heavily on both defense and offense. Lassman has not recovered from an injury received in the Carnegie Tech game and will be confined to his room in a Pittsburgh hospital, where he will follow the progress of the game by special wire. Lassman's loss leaves a big gap in the right side of the Violet wall.

Ken Strong, N.Y.U.'s 190-pound halfback and the country's leading scorer, will play his last game tomorrow. In his three years of varsity football, Strong has started every game and never once has he been taken out of a game because of an injury. A unanimous choice for the all-eastern team, Strong hopes to strengthen his claim to all-American honors against the westerners.

Staters Work Out

Coach Paul J. Schlusser sent the Oregon squad through a light workout at the Westchester-Biltmore Country club, Rye, N. Y., today and announced himself as pleased with the condition of the players after the long trip across the continent—the first ever made east by a Pacific coast eleven.

A capacity crowd of 75,000 is expected to see the Pennsylvania-Cornell game at Franklin field, Philadelphia. Cornell hasn't scored a point in its last four games against Princeton, Columbia, St. Bonaventura and Dartmouth, but this fact has not lessened interest in the traditional battle—the thirty-fifth between the two eleveners.

Syracuse is pinning its hopes for victory over Columbia to Captain Hal Haysinger, one of the east's greatest quarterbackers. Hugo Bezdek of Penn State and Ernest Bears of Nebraska are high in their praise of Haysinger as one of the year's best field generals.

Game At 11 a. m.

Brown and Colgate will introduce an innovation by starting their annual game at 11 a. m. The game will be the final one for Tuss McLaughry under his present contract as Brown coach.

W. & J., already beaten five times and tied once, closes one of the most disastrous seasons in its history against the strong West Virginia eleven.

Pittsburgh expects to repeat its 30 to 0 triumph of last year against Penn State.

Francis Beats Nationalista

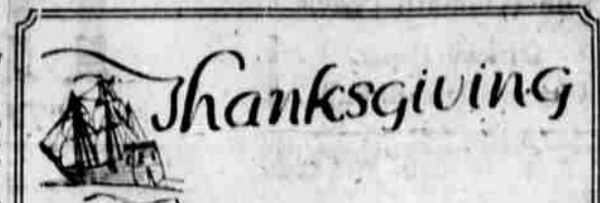

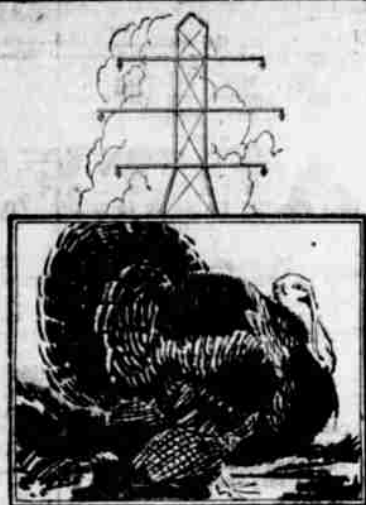
