GEORGIA TECH TO PLAY BEARS

Two Universities Approve
Tournament of Roses
Football Game

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 30. (UP)—Georgia Tech will play the University of California at the Tournament of Roses, Pasadena, New Year's day, it was announced here today.

Sanction of the match both by the southern intercollegiate conference and the Tech faculty today eliminated the last obstacles in the way of the game. Thursday, the Tech athletic board voted in favor of it, and Dr. M. L. Brittain, president of the school, called a faculty meeting for further consideration.

Almost simultaneously with the faculty's decision, came permission from Dr. S. V. Sanford, president of the conference. This permission was necessary, as post season games are not otherwise allowed.

is the city official newspaper, that the first publication thereof be made on the 1st day of December, 1928, and the second publication shall be made on the 13th day of December, 1928, and the date of the meeting where the said proposed tentative budget may be discussed with the council as the levying board by any taxpayer of the city, shall be fixed for Monday, the 24th day of December, 1928, at 8 o'clock, p. m. at the council chambers at the city hall, City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
