

RICKARD SEEKS REAL FIGHTER

Two Would-Be Champs Fail to Stand the Gaff; Several Ambitious

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. (UP)—Tex Rickard is looking for a fighter who can stand the gaff.

Two of Rickard's prospective champions have been knocked out in five nights by rank outsiders. Knute Hansen's knock-out at the hands of K. C. Christner, 24-year-old Akron heavyweight, has exploded the myth around "the man who was to succeed Tunney."

Griffiths Washout

Jerry (Tuffy) Griffiths, the St. Louis light-heavyweight who had 55 straight victories to his credit, collapsed before the driving fists of James J. Braddock, a young, overlooked Jersey City boy. Griffiths was hailed as "the killer of the ring"—another demeritus. He never landed a solid punch on Braddock.

Hansen was thought so much of that a group of Wall Street financiers formed a syndicate and purchased his contract and engaged Billy Gibson, who piloted Benny Leonard and Gene Tunney to world's championships, to handle him. In his first start under Gibson's direction, Hansen was knocked out in the eighth round of a 10-round bout at Cleveland last night.

Rickard Disgusted
"It looks like the minute you say something nice about a promising young fighter, he gets the swell head and forgets how to fight," Rickard said. "I never saw anything like it."

Braddock and Christner now find themselves thrust into the boxing spotlight and will have every opportunity to prove just how good they really are. Braddock will meet Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., assassin, in January, and the winner probably will meet Tommy Loughran, 175-pound champion, in a title bout.

Maloney Better
Christner, who did not enter the professional ring until he had passed 50, will be given his chance against Jack Sharkey of Boston, who is almost ready to enter the ring again after an injury which has kept him out of competition for months.

Johnny Risko, who caused most of the trouble in the heavyweight elimination contest last year by defeating Sharkey when the latter was being groomed for a match with Tunney, has been sidetracked temporarily by Jim Maloney, who is making a successful comeback after knockouts at the hands of Sharkey, Godfrey and Heeneey two years ago.

Heeneey Has Flair
Tom Heeneey, who is back in this country after a trip home to Australia, is laid up with the influenza and may not be able to start training until next year.

Young Stribling and Paulino Uscaden remain the outstanding figures in the heavyweight division, but neither has been able to get a first-class match in months. Stribling can't get one and Paulino doesn't want one.

DETROIT BUYS GOOD PLAYERS

Many Purchases, Trades Made By Clubs at Meeting

TORONTO, Dec. 5. (UP)—The Detroit Tigers made a long step towards strengthening their club for the 1929 season today when they purchased Dale Alexander, hard-hitting first baseman, and Johnny Prudden, star right-handed pitcher, from the Toronto International League club at the opening session of the annual meeting of the National Association.

The Tigers gave \$100,000 and two players for the Toronto stars. Alexander led the International League in batting last season and is a former Syracuse university athlete. He is bigger than Lou Gehrig, first baseman of the New York Yankees. Prudden is only 22.

Yanks, A's Dicker

The New York Yankees and Philadelphia Athletics were still dickering for third basemen tonight. The Yankees may acquire Ossie Blalock in a trade with the Washington Senators.

Ponke Bush, manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, has a deal pending for Steve Sweeton, Indianapolis pitcher, who starred in the "little world series."

Heinie Groh, former New York Giant, was appointed manager of the Hartford Eastern League club. Mickey O'Neil, another former Giant, was sold to Louisville by Toledo.

Brewers Buy John

Art John, who was traded by the Giants to the Phillies last season, was sold outright by the Philadelphia club to Portland.

Johnny Butler, former third baseman of the Chicago Cubs, was sold to Los Angeles.

Russell Miller and August Walsh, pitchers, were sold to Los Angeles by the Philadelphia Phillies.

Milwaukee sold Fred Bennett, formerly property of the Cardinals, to the Wichita Falls Texas League club.

Draft Problem Worry

Bernie Neils, formerly big league outfielder, was purchased by the Cincinnati Reds from Seattle.

Routine matters and rumors of a new draft proposal were considered by between 400 and 500 baseball men at the first meeting. A new solution for the perplexing draft problem caused considerable discussion. This new proposal, which may be embodied in a resolution presented by Judge Brannan, president of four little minor leagues of the south, raised the draft price to \$10,000 and otherwise protects the larger minor leagues, which have steadfastly opposed the "right of selection." The resolution may be introduced Thursday.

An official bulletin, signed by four physicians, said the king's lung infection was "still active."

The night bulletin said: "Though the king had a quiet day, his temperature has risen to a point higher than at the same hour last evening, showing that recrudescence of the infection still is active, his strength is maintained."

Wales Rushes Home
Meanwhile, the prince of Wales continued to make fast time toward Suez. The cruiser H. M. S. Enterprise, carrying him to London from Dar-es-Salaam, East Coast of Africa, left Aden Arabia for Suez late today, according to United Press dispatches.

The duke of Gloucester was enroute to Cape Town, South Africa, tonight, where he expected to arrive in time to catch the Friday mail boat for London. He left Mafeking at 6 p. m., after receiving word of his father's condition. A hotbox delayed his train near Bulawayo Tuesday night and the prince dismounted, doffed his coat and helped the engineer repair the damage.
