STRONG MATMEN WILL WRESTLE

Event Opens 8:30 at Legion Hall; Good Preliminaries Arranged

Tonight at 8:30 in American Legion hall, which will be well heated, and in which good seats have been placed, Klamath fans will be treated to a wrestling match between two heavyweights who are well up in the game. Hassan Mahammed, "The Terrible Turk," meets Young Ritter, baby giant from Gold Hill. Hassan has wrestled and won matches from some of the best heavyweights in the world, and would take a match with Ed "Scrangler" Lewis if it was offered. He isn't afraid of any-

thing. He weighs 215 pounds and comes from a family of wrestlers. He is the fourth generation. None are too tough for "The Terrible Turk."

Bends Iron Bars
He can drive a nail through a two-inch plank with his bare hand. He trains by bending iron bars, holding them between his teeth and bending them with his strong hands and arms. He is a powerful man. His favorite hold is the double wristlock.

Young Ritter hasn't quite such a romantic way of training, and has not had quite so much experience, but he weighs 30 pounds more than "The Terrible Turk" and has studied wrestling and practiced it with some of the best wrestlers in the northwest. He hails from Gold Hill, and keeps in shape by hard work mixed with workouts on the mat.

DRAFT MATTER LAID ON TABLE

Two Major League Players Deals Reported At Meeting

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 6. (UP)—The draft question was tabled by the national association late this afternoon.

The suave diplomacy of John Conway Toole, president of the International League, prevented all friction over the much-discussed "right of selection," when a resolution he introduced was adopted unanimously by the annual meeting.

Meeting Set
Discussion of the various amendments to the major-minor agreement concerning the draft question was postponed by the national association upon Toole's promise that committees from the various larger minor leagues would meet within 10 days to take up the problem.

Cal Ewing, for the Pacific Coast league, said that a meeting of his circuit would be held in January, at which the draft would be considered, and President Thomas J. Hickey of the American association, the other class AA league interested in opposition to the principle of selection, said he "heartily concurred in the proposition to lay the whole affair over."

Deals Rumored
A special meeting of the national association, or at least of representatives of the various classifications, will be necessary next year if the matter of the draft is to be discussed before the 1929 meeting at Chattanooga in December.

Two big major league deals were on the fire tonight, possibly completed, but still unconfirmed.

Walter Johnson, the new manager of the Washington Senators, negotiated with the Boston Red Sox for Buddy Myer, the young infielder who formerly was with the Senators. Johnson, at latest reports, was to give five players. Lisenbee, Gaston, Reeves, Cronin and Gillis, in exchange for the Boston third baseman. Myer will play third for the Senators, Johnson said, and Bluege shortstop. Myer was not highly thought of when last with Washington and was traded to Boston for Rigney.

Another deal, consummated but not announced, concerned the transfer of a veteran pitcher from Cincinnati to the New York Giants. None could name the pitcher with certainty except Jack Hendricks and John J. McGraw, and they were mute, promising an announcement on Monday. Adolfo Luque or Pete Donohue may be the pitcher.

COBB REFUSES HONOR PARTY

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 6. (UP)—Officials and sportsmen of Honolulu were amazed today when Ty Cobb, major league baseball player, arrived here from the Orient and refused invitations for functions that had been arranged in his honor.

J. Ashman Heaven, local sports promoter, who had failed in negotiations for an exhibition baseball game for Cobb here because football games were to be played on the only open dates, had made preparations for an elaborate reception to the diamond star. He had planned a sight-seeing tour and a luncheon to be attended by Governor Wallace R. Farrington.

When the liner President Jefferson docked, Heaven boarded the vessel and placed a letter over Cobb's head. Then Heaven informed Cobb an automobile car was waiting to show him the sights of Honolulu and Cobb declined the offer. A few minutes later he refused the invitation to attend the luncheon.

Pays \$25,000 for Interest in DeVos

NEW YORK, Dec. 6. (UP)—The deal by which Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, Jr., millionaire sportsman, became part owner of Rene De Vos' contract was completed today when Biddle paid \$25,000 for 20 per cent interest in the Belgian middleweight.

Biddle purchased 13 1/2 per cent of the contract held by Lou Burston, De Vos' manager, and the other 16 1/2 from De Vos himself. Jimmy Bronson, chief second to Gene Tunney in both his fights with Jack Dempsey, will represent Biddle and share the actual handling of De Vos with Burston.

De Vos, a veteran of 12 years' ring experience, will meet Ace Hudkins at Madison Square Garden Monday night. The winner will be in line for a match with Mickey Walker, the middleweight champion.

De Vos is an 8 to 5 favorite to win over Hudkins.

Heavyweights Sail for Battle

NEW YORK, Dec. 6. (UP)—Paulino Uzcudun and Jack Renault, heavyweights, who will meet in Cal, Colombia, Christmas day, were passengers on the Grace liner Santa Teresa when the ship sailed today for South America.

Paulino plans to stop enroute for an exhibition at Panama. On the return he will stop for a fight in Porto Rico, Jan. 5.

OREGON TEAMS MAY PLAY U.S.C.

Managers Await Word from U.S.C., Stanford Officials

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6. (UP)—Pending arrangements for 1929 intercollegiate football games kept the Pacific Coast Conference schedule makers tentative here today at the first session of their annual three-day meeting.

Until the arrival here Friday from New York of Graduate Manager Al Master of Stanford and word from General Manager Edwin Wilson of Southern California, now in conference with Notre Dame officials in South Bend, delegates can accomplish little.

"If those intercollegiate games that are blocking us," one manager yelled.

"California is scheduled to play Pennsylvania at Philadelphia October 19 and can't give the rest of us fellows any definite date until it sees how Stanford, Washington and Southern California line up their schedules. Southern California can't say a word until Knute Rockne tells the Trojans whether he will play them next season, and if so, where."

Two northwest schools, University of Oregon and Washington State, are exhibiting keen interest in Southern California's schedule. Washington State has been playing the Trojans since the days when the Trojans were not in the conference, and probably will be booked Oregon State also probably will be signed.

The other Oregon school, University of Oregon, may get the November 16 date if Knute Rockne is not played in Chicago on that
