

TEN-MEN TEAM IDEA VETOED

American League Refuses to Send Representative to League Meet

CHICAGO, Dec. 12. (UP)—The "ten-men" baseball team idea, advanced by President John Heydler of the National League, failed to find an approving voice among the owners and directors of the American League here today.

The question was discussed several hours, following which a vote was taken. The result was the unanimous disapproval by the American League heads.

Heydler's proposal was made with the view that a pitcher who was "going good" in a close game could be saved for his team if a "pitch man" or pinch hitter were made available. The pinch hitter's presence in the game would have no effect on the pitcher's status and he could continue in the game without batting.

The American League circuit was in a festive mood today and voted also not to send any representatives to the meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues at West Baden, Ind., at which the draft question was to be considered.

Frank Navin, owner of the Detroit Tigers, was re-elected vice-president of the American League today. Phil Ball, owner of the St. Louis Browns; Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Athletics and Clarke Griffith of the Washington club will serve with Navin on the board of directors.

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FEATHERWEIGHT BOUTS POPULAR

Canzoneri, Singer Match Friday, Slattery to Meet Delaney

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (UP)—Popular prices and new faces have stimulated interest in boxing and Tex Rickard expects Friday night's bout between Tony Canzoneri, former featherweight champion, and Al Singer, young Bronx boy, to draw the third capacity house at Madison Square Garden this winter.

With a top price of \$5.49 prevailing, the Canzoneri-Singer bout is expected to duplicate the successes of the Joe Glick-Baby Joe Gans and Tuffy Griffith-Jimmy Braddock bouts. Both drew capacity crowds.

Since losing his featherweight crown to Andre Routsis of France, Canzoneri has defeated Gaston Charles, rugged Frenchman, and knocked out Chick Suggs. Singer overnight has bounded to the front ranks of the featherweights, and in recent bouts has scored knockouts over Moskowitz, Johnny Lawson and Pete Zivic.

Tommy Loughran's departure from Chicago to start his heavy-weight campaign Monday night against Big Boy Peterson, who won over Paulino Uzcudun on a foul at Ebbets field last summer, has resulted in two of the outstanding 175-pound contenders giving up hopes temporarily for a title bout with Loughran, and agreeing to meet themselves.

Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo, who gave Loughran a close call in a title bout last year, and Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., former light heavyweight titleholder, signed today to meet in a 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden January 4. In two previous 6-round bouts, Slattery won the decision each time.

GEORGIA TECH MEN HAVE FLU

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 12. (UP)—Three of the 31 Georgia Tech football players selected for the game with the University of California, at Pasadena, Calif., New Year's Day, in the Tournament of Roses, were reported suffering from influenza today.

This may alter the lineup of the Tech, contingent greatly, as many others on the team have had colds. The three reported ill are Brooke, guard; Edwards, relief guard, and Pathef Limpin, end. Warner Mizell, back, is recovering from the "flu" also.

Liquor Selling on Reservation Must Stop, Is Warning

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12. (AP)—Sale of moonshine on the Klamath Indian reservation must stop, this declaration was made by assistant United States district attorney Francis Marsh in federal district court today when Max Landazuri, Mexican laborer, pleaded guilty to eight counts of an indictment charging sale of liquor to Klamath Indians.

Federal Judge McNary sentenced Landazuri to 15 months in McNeil's Island. Landazuri is the second Mexican to enter a plea of guilty to charges of selling liquor on the Klamath reservation within the last week.

INVITE MAPLE TO PLAY EAST, WEST CONTEST

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 12.—Howard Maple, Orange quarterback, has been invited to play in the East-West game December 26 in the Kezar stadium, San Francisco, according to announcement made by officials of Islam temple of Shrine. The game is played for the benefit of Shriner's crippled children's hospital. Maple has been mentioned as all-American quarterback by a number of authorities this year after his showing in the victory over New York university.

The scheduling of the Carnegie Tech game here was considered necessary because of three big games away from home next year—Stanford, Washington and Notre Dame.

Amory "States" Gill, Orange mentor, has cut the squad to 23 players and is tentatively working the Oregon Staters for the coming conference campaign which opens January 19 at Pullman against Washington State. The Orangemen will train in Corvallis during the Christmas vacation except for a short harn-storming tour of the northwest, including games in Portland and Tacoma.

The squad now includes Frank Patterson, home captain, Oremel Shreve, Cliff Curry, Rod Ballard, Sid Johnson, Eugene O'Bryan, Ralph Callahan, Johnny Jansick, forwards; Carl Aase, Jim Torson, centers; Bud Waecher, road captain, Del Anderson, Buck Grayson, Del Mitchell, Carl Moor, Walter Emigh, Gene Duncan, Mac McMahon, guards. With the return of the victorious Orange eleven from New York Howard Maple, George Scott, Cotton Whitlock and John Dinger will don basketball regalia instead to maulskins.

Coach Gill has been emphasizing defensive work and fundamentals in practice. The first game of the season will be December 21 with the Multnomah club in Portland. Ray Gray, guard and captain in 1926, and Carlos Steele, guard and captain of the championship northwest conference Orangemen in 1924, are playing for the Winwood "M" five.

Too Much Red Ink Discolors Ledger of School Board

FRENO, Calif., Dec. 12. (UP)—A certain Fresno county school board has been "in the red" figuratively and literally for the past few months, it was revealed here.

The unusual condition, it was said, came about because the board members, fearing a shortage in the red ink supply of the world, imprudently invested all the school funds in that more or less indispensable commodity.

The story as told by Thomas G. La Blane of the California Taxpayers' association, is that a high pressure supply salesman visited the board and succeeded in convincing the body that the price of ink was about to skyrocket to unheard of heights. If any red ink was to be required for a long time to come, now was the psychological moment to buy, he urged.

Apparently profoundly impressed with the seriousness of the situation, the board promptly placed an order for five barrels of red ink—sufficient, it has been estimated, to last 500 years. The amount of the bill raised hovers with the available funds of the school district and red ink has been used exclusively ever since as the standard benchmark of the district previous purchase of other supplies.
