BRITISH FRIENDS OF AMERICANS

Lloyd George Says People Would Not Tolerate Unfriendly Acts

LONDON, Dec. 12, (UP)—British people will not tolerate even the thought of a serious dispute with the United States, former Premier Lloyd George said today at a luncheon of American correspondents arranged by the United Press in honor of Robert J. Bender, its vice president in charge of news. Britain's friendliness to America, Lloyd George said, was shown when the entire country repudiated the British-French naval agreement after the United States had shown hostility to it. "If the United States and Great Britain work together for peace, their influence will be irresistible," he added.

Place Return on Christmas Mail, Advises McCall

Attention of Postmaster John McCall was directed to a letter today in which information was given telling of between three and four million dead letters containing Christmas and New Year cards in addition to normal receipt of ordinary undeliverable letters being counted at dead letter headquarters.

This enormous increase in undeliverable matter is, due primarily to incorrect addresses, but would still be preventable in spite of incorrect addressing if the patrons of the service could be persuaded to place their return addresses on the envelopes contrary to the widespread custom of mailing greeting cards in nonward envelopes. "If patrons of the mails could be persuaded to write their return addresses on the covers of these letters not only they but the post office service would be saved much trouble and annoyance," McCall concluded.
