The people of Paisley want a road to shorten the distance to Klamath Falls, which is their large trading center. This is natural and right, and this city should aid Paisley people in every way possible to secure the needed improvement.

With the main trunk line to Lakeview almost completed, it is the proper thing to begin to put in branch lines as feeders. No main line railroad ever paid. It has to have feeder lines. The same is true of highway systems. The trunk lines are fine, but in order to make the picture complete and serve the greatest number of people, there must be branches.

This is proven out in the market road system which Oregon has adopted. The market roads are in fact feeders to the main line highways. Paisley people ask that forest road be designated and in that request they are on a sound basis, for the national forest lies along the zone to be traveled by the proposed road. Let us all get in and help Paisley people get their road.
