

Two Said Guilty Of Riddle's Death

(Continued From Page One)

Few witnesses were called by Coroner Earl Whitlock or the state, represented by T. R. Gilenwaters, assistant district attorney. Neither Burton Baker nor his wife Marie Baker took the stand.

Dr. O. E. Patterson, Agency doctor, told of the condition of the body after performing an autopsy upon it earlier in the afternoon.

"Death was caused," he said, "by a blow on the head which fractured, and penetrated the skull and brain. Death came practically instantly."

Two Fractures There were two fractures of the skull and one laceration on the head. One fracture, the larger, was above the left eye, near the top of the head. A smaller fracture, which also caused a depression on the brain, was on the top of the head near the back. The severe cut was over the right eye and on the head about opposite the largest fracture, the doctor said.

Either blow could have caused death, the larger more quickly, Dr. Patterson stated.

The left shoulder and the elbows showed abrasions, supposed by from the fight which occurred. The department of justice special agent testified to the death of Riddle, the actions of officers, and the finding of the body.

Minerva Brown and her husband, Harry Brown, told of finding the body. Minerva Brown is a sister of the murdered man.

Baker Houses Officers David Chocktoot, Indian police officer at Beatty, told of Riddle's disappearance. He stated that on December 5, Levi Duffy, Parker Hubbard and himself had called Burton Baker to Simon's store in Beatty and asked Baker what had become of Riddle. Baker was the last person seen with Riddle, witnesses stated. Baker said that he had let him out of the car, west of Beatty. He took the three to a place where he said he let Riddle out and showed them tracks. Chocktoot stated. The place Baker took them is nearly a mile closer to Beatty than the scene of the crime. A search at the place pointed out by Baker proved futile.

Witnesses told officers that the place where Baker took the other Indians that night and showed them tracks was where Baker and Riddle, who are said to have been riding around together in a car on November 28, went during the afternoon to get whiskey which they had hidden near there.

Chocktoot also said that Baker and Riddle were intoxicated the afternoon of the fight.

The department of justice agent appeared before the jury in closed session.

No new evidence was brought out in the case, facts already being told being sufficient to convince the jury of the need to hold Burton Baker, 21-year-old Klamath Indian, and his 15-year-old wife, a Plute Indian from Arizona, for further investigation and probably for trial in federal court in connection with Riddle's death.

The first publication of said notice shall be not less than 20 days for the first publication and not less than 10 days for the second publication, prior to the date of such meeting, and

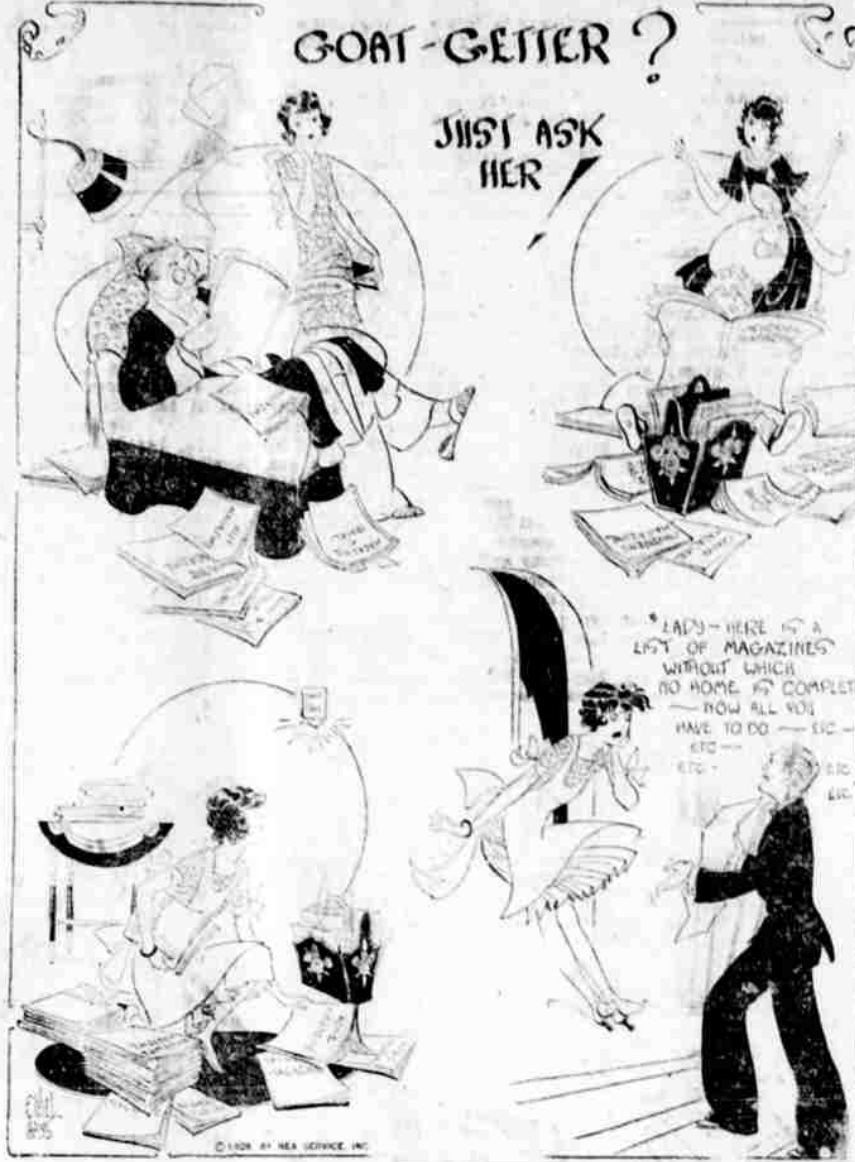

Benefits Result From Hunter Law, Says S. G. Jewett

Although men have fought coyotes since the first days of livestock raising, there are still plenty of them left. It was pointed out yesterday by Stanley G. Jewett, head of the biological survey for Oregon, in a talk at the chamber of commerce forum, when he reviewed the benefits that arrive from regular government hunters.

Since the legislature changed the law, abolishing bounties and establishing government trappers, 50,000 coyotes have been killed in Oregon, the speaker went on to say, which, if all of them were stood end to end in a column would be 19 times as high as Mt. Hood.

He gave statistics to show that the expense to Oregon is much less under the hunter system than under the bounty law. Under the old statute, frequently female coyotes would be preserved in order to bear pups so that more scalps could be marketed, the speaker said, also claiming that coyotes were killed in Washington and California and brought into Oregon for the bounty.

Andy Collier, state representative from Klamath county, provided as chairman at the forum. Two vocal numbers were sung by Mr. Barker of Polk county, accompanied by Mrs. George McIntyre.

SEATTLE, Dec. 12. (UP)—A "no divorce" ultimatum until after the holidays was in effect in King county tonight with the ruling of Presiding Judge Adam Beeler that divorces will not be granted until after Christmas, for couples who have children.

The jurist declared that he was following the example of Judge Thomas Graham, the "great reconciler" of San Francisco, who has declined divorces in like periods for 21 years. "Judge Graham's plan has been instrumental in reuniting many families every year. It is done solely for the children. If it united only one home it would be worth while," said Judge Beeler.
