Locke Returns, Has High Praise For New Chevrolet

The four cylinder Chevrolet is a thing of the past and the new sixes will be here on December 29th, according to W. E. Locke, local Chevrolet dealer who returned yesterday morning from the showing in Portland. Approval is a mild word to express the enthusiasm being voiced by the Klamath dealer

There were seven models on display, all passenger cars, and from twelve o'clock noon until midnight 12,000 people visited the Portland Auditorium in order to see the new vehicle. Of these 123 placed orders for one or another of the cars on display. This is the best coast record so far, according to the statistics presented by Mr. Locke.

Since cars will be available by December 29 to all dealers the present showing, which started the latter part of November in the east, will be disbanded and the cars sent to various zones.

Colors and bodies of all models are changed and are the newest thing in motors, according to Mr. Locke. Deeper cushions, more comfortable seats and more head room are some changes in the interior particularly noticeable. Another thing, all bodies from the smallest to the most pretentious passenger car now manufactured by Chevrolet, will be by Fisher. Wheels are one inch smaller thus giving the passenger cars a lower appearance, which is enhanced by a graceful, curving fender.

Mr. Locke stopped in town only long enough to tell his employees what to expect December 29th and then prepared to depart early this morning for Yakima, Washington to spend Christmas with friends and relatives.

Senate Adjourns, Cruiser, Treaty Still Unpassed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (UP)—Under a Christmas truce the senate has laid aside the anti-war treaty and the 15 cruiser bill until after the holidays.

When the senate reconvenes January 3, a vote will be taken to determine which measure shall be acted upon first. A majority vote will decide this issue.

Fight Bitter. This truce was proposed in the form of a unanimous consent agreement today by Senator Borah, chairman of the foreign relations committee, after feeling between the chief proponents of the two measures became so bitter that it threatened to tie up senate business completely until the Christmas adjournment Saturday.

Navy Bill Blocked. Backers of the navy bill renewed their attempt to get the right of way for it after having been blocked last night by the objections of Senators Norris, Neuhaska republican, and King, Utah democrat. Today they were on the point of obtaining a favorable vote when by quick parliamentary maneuvering, in which Senator Norris joined for a time by making a motion which he actually voted against, the navy drive was blocked and a truce declared.

What will happen when the fight is resumed January 3, is subject to possible peace conferences during the Christmas holidays.

Search Fails To Locate Missing Eugene Man Here

A search of all rooming houses and hotels in the city last night failed to locate Merle Terrill who is reported missing by relatives in Eugene.

Keith Ambrose, chief of police, received a telegram yesterday from Chief of Police James F. Strait of Eugene asking that a search be made for Terrill, and stating that foul play was feared. Terrill sent a telegram from the local Western Union office yesterday morning at 10:05 saying, "Am O. K. in Klamath Falls." His parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Terrill.

The clerk who took the telegram stated that Terrill appeared "dazed" when he gave the telegram.

The telegram to Chief Ambrose describes Terrill as: "24 years old; height 5 feet 7 inches, weight 175 pounds, light brown hair, blue eyes, wore glasses, grey suit, hat grey, overcoat," and ended by saying "may be out of head."

At the Pine Tree

One of the most gripping and enthralling pictures of the season is "The Bugle Call." Jackie Coogan's new starring vehicle, now showing at the Pine Tree theatre. It is an Edward Sedgwick production, with Claire Windsor and Herbert Rawlinson heading an extremely capable cast. It is young Coogan's first nearly grown-up role, and is perhaps best described as a poignant human-interest story of the days just before the Civil War told against a background of battles between the cavalymen and the red men.

Jackie plays the part of a bugle boy at a Western cavalry camp who harbors a deep and loyal devotion to the memory of his dead mother. His father re-marries and commands the boy to address his stepmother as mother, and to transfer his affections to her. The ensuing conflict, which ends happily in the boy's capitulation, provides many dramatic scenes with a climax that brought a burst of applause from yesterday's excited audience.

Claire Windsor as the step-mother and Herbert Rawlinson as the boy's father contribute vastly to the success of the film, which has been produced on an elaborate and impressive scale.

Tax Committee To Recommend Bill

line tax for the present one mill market road levy, with the provision that if adjustment of automobile licenses by the legislature should give more revenue to the highway commission than it now receives, the additional money should be applied to the market road fund and thus reduce the gasoline tax proportionally.

To repeal the super-road district law.

Market Road Law. To amend the state market road law so counties will not be required to match state market road funds by county funds in order to enjoy the benefits of market road financing, as at present.

To enact a law, which would vest power in the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, to sit as a board of appeal and pass on the feasibility of any initiated tax or bond proposal, either local or state, prior to its submission to the electorate of Oregon, provided an appeal against the proposal has been filed by a taxpayer.

Voting on Bonds. To impel the county school superintendent to act as a purchasing agent for all school districts except those of the first class.

To provide that when a bond issue is up for vote, and no property qualification was required of the voter, the total vote cast must be 50 per cent of the total vote cast at the last preceding election or the issue cannot be voted upon.

To extend to the people of the counties the same full power of adopting their own individual forms of government as now is in effect in cities under the "home rule amendment" of the state constitution.

To provide that no money not definitely set out for expenditure by definite item in a budget be spent by the governmental unit making the budget.

district to sink holes and check the flow of gas.

In another section, long lines of intensely hot blue flames blazed through thin cracks in the street while the ground in the neighborhood trembled slightly to the rumble of subterranean fires. The public was barred from the area.

Short Sets Fire.

The first blast, caused by a short in an electric cable in a manhole, shot flames more than 50 feet high and tore up the street and sidewalk for a distance of nearly half a mile. The second explosion this afternoon in the same area started a fire in a five-story building which previously had been evacuated because of gas escaping after the morning blast. Gas from the mains hung in the air throughout the day.

Probate in Circuit Court.

To place the probate work of the counties in the circuit court and amend the present law so that fees would be levied and collected within the calendar year.

To memorialize congress to reimburse the state annually for forest reserve lands held off the tax roll with an amount equal to what the state would receive were they in private ownership.

Several other important recommendations were discussed at the meeting but were either shelved, disapproved, or laid aside for further consideration.
