Interest appears to have been stimulated by cable reports of a rise at Geelong, Australia, where wools are suitable for Americans.

Heavyweight Title Contest Progress, Three Acts Today

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (UP)—Three important steps towards the selection of the next heavyweight champion will be made Friday, as follows:

1—The Tunney-Muldoon trophy committee will meet to draw up rules and regulations for the contenders.

2—Johnny Buckley, Sharkey's manager, is due in town from Boston to sign for Sharkey to meet Young Stribling at Miami Beach, Fla., February 26, 27 or 28.

3—Jimmy Maloney's comeback campaign brings him back to Madison Square Garden, where he meets Con O'Kelly, rugged Irishman, in the 10-round main bout.

When Gene Tunney retired last August he announced his plan to donate a trophy, emblematic of the heavyweight championship, which would have the names of all the past champions engraved on it and which would remain the possession of each succeeding heavyweight champion as long as he remained titleholder.

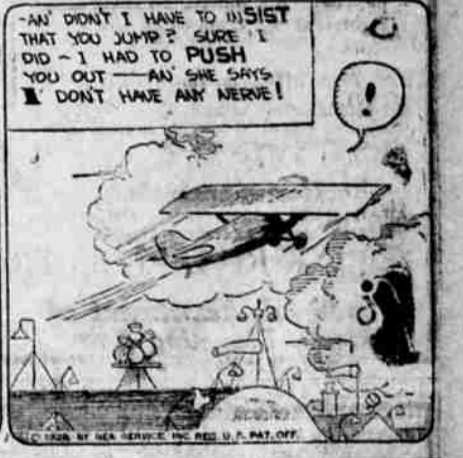
