Bears To Battle Yellow Jackets

Powerful Elevens Meet in South for Championship

Pasadena, Calif., Dec. 31 (UP)—A great defensive California football team probably will stick to its "wait-for-the-break" brand of play here Tuesday when it meets the Yellow Jackets of Georgia Tech in the annual Rose Bowl classic.

There has been some talk that Coach "Nibs" Price would revamp the Bears' style and give them a real offensive, but apparently he has not gone out of his way to do so.

Charging Defense California has had the advantage of a charging defense that makes opposing fumbles and Price thinks it a good brand of ball.

Many of the more than 70,000 fans who will give each of the teams the Rose Bowl something like \$90,000 each fear that Georgia Tech, too, may play defensive ball and slow the game down.

Just what Georgia Tech has is not known. But if Alabama and other southern teams are to be taken as a true example of southern football, the Golden Tornado will use some slashing tackle plays that are just a little bit different and a sweeping end run.

Tech Needs Variety On the expected off tackle play Georgia Tech probably will send Mizell through. Much of the success of this depends on whether California uses six or a seven man line.

Georgia Tech will need a wide variety of plays if California resorts to its expected defensive style, because the ball will be in the southerners' possession much of the time.

California probably will rely strongly on the kicking of Benny Lom. His triple threat half-back. His boots, passes and end runs promise to fear the Bear attack.

Lom Best Punter Lom has shown in practice here that he can out-punt Mizell, Georgia Tech's all-American back, which will be a great advantage in California's defensive style. If he can back the Yellow Jackets up and the fumbles come they will be in dangerous territory.

With brilliant combinations such as Lom, Eisan and Schmidt, of California, and Mizell, Thomson and Lumpkin, of Tech, something sensational in offense ought to develop.

Bears Have Air Advantage California's passes may prove troublesome. Lom is a better passer than Mizell and has two, tall, ball-snaggers at the ends who will have to reach high to get the ball.

The southerners will go into the game at full strength, Raleigh Dennon, giant guard, having fully recovered from a light touch of influenza. With "the Rambling Wreck" all present the 200 Tech rosters here for the game cannot understand the odds which make California a 10 to 3 favorite.

The loyal Georgians having been taking up the California challenge money as fast as it comes their way.

Georgia Tech won through a light drill today and California was to have done the same, but elected at the last minute to put in two hours on the field.

New York, Dec. 31 (UP)—A relentless drive of youth against the old, established order in the world of sport will be under way in 1929.

The new year brings a fresh threat to the supremacy of those champions who withstood all challengers during 1928.

Veterans Pass The sports world is in the process of change, with the passing of many veterans as another year arrives.

No longer can the New York Yankees look ahead serenely to a share of October's world series coin; the old order in football was shaken last fall as never before and faces even stiffer and more widespread competition in 1929; not a single ring champion can view the coming year's engagements with comfort and assurance; competition in track and field is being taken up by a new and younger group as veterans who made their final bid at Amsterdam hang up their spiked shoes.

Jones, Tilden The tennis world awaits the return of Bill Tilden before figuring upon America's chances of a come-back on the courts of 1929. As matters stand now, there is little likelihood of France's present supremacy being endangered.

In the world of golf, there is only one Bobby Jones. The question is not so much whether some amateur can overthrow the Atlanta at Pebble Beach next September, but whether Bobby

will not annex the professional title at Mamaroneck as well.

Battle Scenes Change In women's tennis, Helen Wills stands out. She is the safest bet of the new year. But in women's golf, one of the most uncertain of competitions, Glenna Collier of Providence, who returned to the top this year, has no sinecure.

Some of the big events of 1929 will be held in new locations. A prize fight of close championship proportions is scheduled for Miami Beach, Florida, late in February. The amateur golf championship goes to California for the first time as does the P. G. A. tournament.

More new faces will see out major league diamonds than for many seasons, with a number of old timers, Cobb, Speaker and contemporaries, missing.

New Heavy Expected The retirement of Charley Paddock, of Lloyd Hahn and Sabin Cary and Jole Ray, removed a group of leaders from the world of amateur track and field, so that the opening gun of the indoor season this week will send a new and younger group of athletes away in quest of glory.

The new year is expected to provide us with a new heavy-weight champion. Tex Rickard's arrangements, once regarded as infallible, have gone awry on recent occasions, but the promoter is hopeful of crowning a successor to Gene Tunney before the year is out.
