Klamath Stockmen To Meet Saturday

then be submitted to the state legislature in January.

The legislation will be in regard to regulation of the disposition of beef and beef products, and to make it impossible for anyone to dispose of beef secured illegitimately. Sanitation in the killing of stock will also be discussed at the meeting.

Robberies Costly

"Many thousands of dollars worth of beef is annually stolen in Oregon. We get reports in this office frequently of the theft of beef cattle in our own county. Here is a letter from Grant county telling of the depredations there." County Agent Henderson said yesterday.

"I would say that there is annually in Klamath county from all stockmen in the neighborhood of \$25,000 to \$40,000 of beef stolen," the agent stated.

Cattle Crop Largest

With the cost of production higher than in the days when cattle rustlers were active, the thieves cut further into the profits of the stockmen. It is stated.

The cattle crop is the largest grown in Klamath county. During the past year nearly a million and a quarter dollars worth of beef was marketed from the Klamath Basin. It is stated by Agent Henderson.

Stockmen's associations of the state have combined to draft the necessary legislation to make the thefts of beef unprofitable and impossible, it is stated.

Court House Will Be Closed Today

Public offices of the county court house will again close their doors for the third holiday during the Christmas season, not including Sunday's. Because New Year's day is a legal holiday, the county court has officially ordered that all offices be closed to regular business.

Other public offices in the city, as well as banks and business will also be closed for the day.

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
