Another clue which police had hoped would lead to the man who strangled June and threw her body into the ditch collapsed at the outset of the investigation.

Shoes, Stockings Missing

When the body was found, June's shoes and stockings were missing. In an abandoned automobile nearby police found a pair of child's shoes. The machine belonged to a Magna man. The shoes turned out not to be June's and he established an alibi.

June and Betty, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Nelson, left home Monday evening on an errand to a neighboring store. Betty went home later and told her parents a man had "chased" them and that she had returned after seeing June enter the grocery store.

June's father searched the neighborhood all night and this morning, during the night he passed the ditch where the body was found. He said he was certain the body was not there Monday night. It apparently had been thrown from an automobile about daybreak, it was indicated.
